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



FOLLOWING is a "snapshot" of the sequence of events that has transpired within Council in its endeavours to contend with the community's stated desire for the re-introduction of a Hard Waste Collection Service.

Latrobe City Council ceased its previous Hard Waste Collection Service in June 2004 when the "three bin system" was introduced. There were concerns raised at the time about risk to the public such as trip hazards from Hard Waste left on roadsides; risk to workers handling large or bulky items inappropriately, and concerns for visual amenity and hygiene in the period preceding the collections.

To address community concerns in relation to the disposal of large items, Council put together a Project Group

in March 2006. The Project Group consisted of community representatives nominated by Morwell, Chamber Commerce; the Merton Ward Residents Association and the Churchill & District Community Association together with a number of Councillors and Officers.

The Project Group examined various options for Hard Waste removal giving consideration to service provision, the mitigation of risks, costs etc.

Subsequently, the Project Group reached consensus on recommending a model to Council that included the provision of Transfer Station Vouchers and an option of an "at-call" service at an additional cost. This model also provided a discount to pensioners who elect to utilise the "atcall" service. Council and the Project Group recognised that no service can be delivered "free".

Council adopted the Project Group's recommendations to introduce its proposed model and to monitor and review its implementation, at its meeting on 19th March, 2007.

Monitoring of the implementation of the Hard Waste service is already being undertaken, with a meeting of the Group having been held last

# **Hard Waste Collection Service** Cr Darrell White

Tuesday, 30th October. The Group commenced reviewing the service by analysing data collected in relation to community feedback received, utilisation of Vouchers and bookings for the "at-call" service.

The outcome of the Group's review will be tabled at the Ordinary Council meeting to be held on 19th November, 2007. The review outcome will provide Council and the community with data and further recommendations in relation to the re-introduction of the Hard Waste service.

#### Churchill & District Intergenerational Hub

Work on the design for the Churchill & District Intergenerational Hub is reaching its final stages. The floor plan for the building was "signed off" in August this year and over the past two months the architects along with community stakeholders and Latrobe City officers have been designing the more technical aspects such as fit-out and fittings, engineering and structural design.

A key aspect of the Hub design has been the use of environmentally sustainable design principles to reduce the impact of the building on the environment. These include solar hot water, photovoltaic cells to generate electricity, energy efficient lighting and air-conditioning, water recycling, and the use of environmentally friendly fabrics and paints.

The tender to construct the Hub is due to be advertised in the third week of November and it is anticipated that the successful builder will be chosen in time to commence construction in February 2008.

# Hard Waste - CDCA Member of the **Project Review Group**

The introduction of Council's new Hard Waste Service has been quite controversial in some quarters and a number of rate-payers have expressed their dissatisfaction at being charged for tip vouchers that may not be used. Some have called for a refund on the \$24 that they have been charged.

The Council convened Hard Waste Project Review Group met at the end of October, as part of the Group's scheduled monitoring process. Concerns expressed by rate-payers opposed to the scheme were discussed in detail. Some 500 objections have been received by

Some rate-payers have called for the immediate scrapping of Council's Hard Waste Service. All members of the Project Review Group agreed that it was too soon, after only a couple of months, to discontinue the service.

Other information at hand was also noted. Since the vouchers were distributed with the rates notices on September 3, more than 1800 of the vouchers have been handed in at the Transfer Stations as residents exchange the vouchers to dispose of their hard waste. Additionally, some 76 bookings have been made for the at-call service.

There are 27,000 rate-paying tenements in Latrobe City. The hard

waste vouchers have a bar-code, so that Council can identify the property for which they were issued. This is in order to identify take-up at both the Transfer stations and through the at-call service. The vouchers may be used by residents not living at the property address, which enables the vouchers to be sold or used by neighbours, friends and family willing to assist others with hard waste

The Project Group originally decided that all rate-payers should make a financial contribution for the provision of this service, just as all rate-payers make a contribution to the costs of providing other Council services such as kindergartens, libraries, park maintenance, etc, regardless of whether the service is utilised by the specific individual.

The costs of transfer station fees for hard waste and the provision of an at-call service were carefully calculated and the \$24 fee for 3 vouchers struck, along with the cost of the at-call service.

It was estimated that some 90% of vouchers might be used and so the remaining 10%, paid for but not utilised, would provide the funds needed to subsidise the at-call service to provide a concession rate for pensioners, who might be most in need.

It was also envisaged that landlords who are not residents would

either pass their vouchers on to tenants or use the vouchers to tidy properties and dispose of hard waste as needed. The Office of Housing, as landlord to a significant number of properties in Latrobe, has advised that vouchers are available for tenants to collect from the OoH Morwell office.

Members of the Project Review Group were unable to reach consensus on whether the scheme should immediately be adjusted to allow for refunds on unused vouchers. Some felt that, due to public opinion, Council should do this, whilst others felt that voucher use should be monitored for a longer period. It was also noted that any refunds introduced now would not only increase administrative costs, but threaten the viability of providing a pensioner concession rate for the at-call service.

The views of the Project Group members will be contained in the report to be presented to Council on 19th November. Ultimately, it will be Councillors who decide whether to maintain the current service or modify it in some way.

# Saturday Breakfast

The Breakfast was held on 27 October at the Co-Operating Churches. The guest speakers were Bret and Arch Van Berkel and they spoke about their experiences whilst walking the Kokoda Track in July this year.

Brett initially outlined the military aspects of the Kokoda campaign, giving details of the Australian forces and the tactics employed in fighting the Japanese. In July 1942 Japanese had landed at Buna and Gona on the Papuan north coast and a month later landed another force at Milne Bay. Their intention being to capture Port Moresby on the south coast and hence on to Australia. The barrier for them was the steep, rugged Owen Stanley Mountains crossed

only by a few foot tracks the most important being the Kokoda Track.

Arch spoke about the walk. They were accompanied by two of Brett's cousin and his brother Jie. It had particular significance for them because their grandfather had fought in the battles at Kokoda. They had their grandfather's army hat which they took turns in wearing on the

The mountains were very steep and walking downhill was particularly difficult. They were in an organised group and were helped by about 81 local porters who carried food and equipment, etc. Not everyone completed the walk which required considerable fitness and endurance and they slept in tents and ate basic rations.

We may pray that our hearts are touched and enlightened as God sends the Holy Spirit to bring us wisdom and deeper understanding about what it means to be a person of God.

Verse 31 has Jesus summing up how he wants those who can "listen", to live. "Do to others as you would have them do to you". He is asking us to love our enemies, to do good to those who hate us, to turn the other cheek and to give to others with generosity.

Our Australian society across the past ten years has become narrowly focussed on economics and self interest and has grown a long way from these ideals. Visiting students from other countries see our standard of living and our homes and the plentiful food and the space and marvel at what we have.

They don't see the farmers struggling with drought and the homeless people and the poor. They do see how much we take for granted what we have in this land.

We are an island and we can choose to see ourselves in isolated terms just focusing on what is "best" for us using narrow economic criteria and refusing to face the interconnectedness of all

We could choose to see ourselves as a society with the opportunity to focus on the social and environmental good and put in place the institutions and infrastructures which will support a socially equitable, just and loving society which can act as an example for other countries to fol-

Let us pray, at this time, for people to make choices which are based on love and equity, not


Bill has been a member of the Hall Committee since 1949 and

Bill was celebrating his 85th Birthday and cut his cake for everyone to enjoy.

# Latrobe Residents Affected by Cancer Urged to Call Helpline

The Cancer Council Victoria is encouraging Shire of Latrobe residents who are concerned about cancer to call The Cancer Council Helpline on 13 11 20.

Latest Cancer Council statistics show more than 340 Shire of Latrobe residents are diagnosed each year, with bowel, prostate and breast cancer representing almost 40% of these new cases.

The Cancer Council Helpline is a free and confidential service where people can talk with a cancer nurse regarding their concerns about cancer. Callers can also receive cancer information and be put in touch with local support services.

Dr Amanda Hordern, Deputy Director of the Cancer Information and Support Service at the Cancer

Council said the Cancer Council Helpline provided an opportunity for people living in regional Victoria to talk to a qualified cancer nurse in their own time.

"We are encouraging people to call and speak with our cancer nurses, particularly those in rural and regional areas as they may not have access to doctors and other health professionals in their home town," Dr Hordern said.

"Receiving a cancer diagnosis is an overwhelming experience and many people find it a very confusing and difficult time. Our cancer nurses are here to listen and provide information and support when it is needed most

"We don't provide individual medical advice; we provide accurate

information to help callers make an informed choice and always refer callers back to their treating doctor for further discussion.

"We can also link people up to support services in their area or with Cancer Connect volunteers who have been through a similar experience," Dr Hordern said.

"The Cancer Council Helpline gives people the opportunity to ask anything they like and while remaining completely anonymous and confidential."

# Special Plants in Mathison Park

Mathison Park is mostly land cleared for farming and only recently turned into a park with many native bush species. There is however one little area, the strip along the edge of Tramway Road that still has a remnant of native vegetation. Among the special plants in this area are 11 different species of native lilies and also 5 different species of native orchids.

Two of the orchids are attractive flowers. The Nodding Greenhood Pterostylis nutans is not colourful being only green, but is such an unusual shape for a flower, with a green hood that nods forward. These grow in a dense patch in one spot in the Park.

The other orchid of note is the Wallflower Orchid or Donkey Orchid Diuris corymbosa. It gets the name Wallflower Orchid from the wallflower-like colour of the flowers and the name Donkey Orchid from the two dorsal sepals that stand up prominently like donkey's

These occur as scattered plants in the remnant vegetation along Tramway Road and it is a delight to find one in flower in the springtime.

# Local Laws, Fire Hazards and other information

By Margaret Guthrie, Treasurer Latrobe City's Manager of Local Laws, Peter Fraser, attended our October meeting. Peter advised us that his officers have already commenced property inspections in Churchill, issuing notices for the removal of fire hazards.

Due to the number of complaints received in previous years and the number of properties Council identified as posing fire hazards, the Local Laws Dept decided to target Churchill first this year, before inspecting any other areas in Latrobe. 4 or 5 officers have been doing 'drive-around inspections' since the end of October.

Long grass allowed to grow unchecked at this time of year creates a fire hazard in warm weather. Long grass on vacant blocks around suburban properties also provides a perfect habitat for snakes.

Officers may issue 14 day notices for the removal of fire hazards. At the end of this period, if the hazard remains, a \$205 fine may be

The land may then be cleared by Council contractors and the cost billed to the property owner.

Peter also explained that Local Government is unable to serve notice on a State Government authority, so land owned by the Office of Housing may not be served with 'Fire Hazard Removal' notices. cation of owners.

Instead, the Office of Housing, as Landlord, inspects its own properties and contacts tenants who are required to clean up their property. Housing Services Officers have already commenced their inspections and begun contacting tenants whose yards pose a fire hazard. Peter advised that Council has developed a good working relationship with the Office of Housing and identified OoH properties, including vacant land. Thoset pose a fire danger are attended to reasonably promptly.

Council also receive a high number of complaints from the Churchill area regarding dogs 'off the property'. Fines may be issued to owners for dogs found to be roaming the streets and the animal may be impounded if caught by Local Laws officers. Likewise, owners of unregistered animals may be fined, along with owners who keep more than two dogs or cats, unless they have a permit to do so or are a registered

Officers will be conducting a 'door knock' for unregistered animals early next year. The fine for having an unregistered dog or cat is \$205. Council is introducing compulsory micro-chipping for newly registered pets so that, in time, all registered animals will be microchipped, allowing for easy identifi-

The Council pound, in Driffield Rd Morwell, is open each week day from 9 - 9.30am and 4.30 - 5pm.

Stray animals may be taken to the pound at these times and owners may inspect the pound for lost animals. Alternatively, Council provides a photo gallery of animals held at the pound on its web page, so the animals may be viewed on-line.

When asked about dog-poo on nature strips and footpaths, Peter advised that owners of offending animals may be issued with an onthe-spot fine of \$25.

He advised that residents who encounter this problem on their doorstep should take photos of the dog 'in the act', in order to provide evidence! Owners who walk their dogs are required to clean up their dog's waste matter.

Council is also considering how to tackle the problem of nuisance trail-bike riders. Peter recently visited Frankston Council, where they have introduced measures to deal with this problem.

Under new Frankston By-Laws, bikes may be confiscated and a \$500 fine is issued to the offender. If the fine is paid within 7 days the bike is released after 6 months, but if the fine isn't paid then the bike is not returned at all.

Council's Local Laws officers are on call 7 days a week and Peter himself takes all after-hours emergency calls to Council.

# The First Butchers in Churchill- Tony and Kay Radford

Tony and Kay Radford were Churchill's first butchers and first to open a shop in the town. I was invited to meet Tony and Kay at their business, McDonalds in Traralgon, where over a latte they told me about their family and their lives.

ony's Mother Mary Henderson was born at Lake Boga and is still living at 93 years of age. She married James Radford (dec. 1968) from Sydney. James was born and grew up in Sydney where he went from primary and secondary education, on to Teachers' College. He came to teach at Balranald State School. Mary, at that time, was living near Stoney Crossing, where she had been educated.

James and Mary met, probably at a local dance, and grew to know and love each other, leading to their marriage in Balranald. They had seven children- the twins Margaret and Yvonne, James (dec) Adrian, Tony, Mary (Willaton) and Therese.

From Balranald, the family moved to Swan Hill, then Yallourn, where James secured a job at the SEC. He rose through the position of Director of Fuel Supply to become Senior Manager at Yallourn.

Kay was born in the western District, one of two children.

From Hamilton, the family moved to Morwell. On one occasion when Kay went to a Younger Set dance at Hernes Oak, she met Tony. They didn't take long to decide that they were meant for each other and were married in Yallourn at St. Theresa's Catholic Church in January 1964. Father Frank O'Reagan officiated.

Married life was started in Morwell where Catherine was born, the following year.

Tony had become a qualified butcher after doing an apprenticeship with Latrobe Meat Supplies. Kay had a job as Secretary at Kelly Bros. Motors. Tony later changed to Witson's Butcher.

It was while he was walking down Gude's Arcade in Morwell one day, that he saw Bert Harvey. Bert and his wife were one of Churchill's first resident families. He told Tony that the Housing Commission was wanting shopkeepers to come and occupy the shops built in their new shopping centre in Churchill. He strongly suggested that Tony apply for the Butcher's Shop position.

Tony was only 25 years old he recalls. He had one daughter, and Kay working. They had bought and paid for a block of land in Morwell. Kay's wage had allowed them to pay it off in 38 weeks. They were planning to build a split level house on it. Tony pondered on the suggestion of Bert as he went home that night after work. He and Kay sat down and discussed the pros and cons and decided to give it a go!

Tony stated the Housing Commission had predicted that Churchill would grow by 200 new houses a year. There would a helipad and other wonderful facilities. It would be a wonderful opportunity. Of course it didn't happen!

An application was lodged with the Housing Commission, who accepted their proposal, saying they were the ideal young couple for a young town.

These following memories were recalled with great fun and fondness. Eyes lit up and smiles appeared as the memories came flooding back of these hard, but happy times, and the faces of folks in Churchill. Times that have, I

would say, contributed to colouring their approach to life since then.

In the beginning of their time at Churchill Butchery, they lived in their Commercial Road home in Morwell. On Monday morning, John Keating from Yallourn North would give Tony a lift to Churchill. They had no car. Tony stayed with his sister Mary and her husband Brian Willaton at Jeeralang Junction, for the rest of the week. Brian would drop Tony off and pick him up from work.

Kay came out on the bus, with the baby, to help with the book work. She also made

who needed it, say if unexpected visitors arrived. As long as it was replaced all was well. Tony reassured me they did not do sly grog! Ross kept his medications in the fridge also, until he was able to afford one for himself.

Tony's day started at 4am and finished at 6pm. Everything was cut up by hand. After a while he was able to afford a band saw which cut two hours off his work load. After three years Tony took on an apprentice- Steven Harvey. When Tony's day was over, he walked home with Ross Ollquist. There were no street lights. Kay used to talk about getting a garden

Tony was called upon to be Father Christmas.

The family went to Mass, upstairs in what is now the old Shopping Centre, where the Butcher shop was then. Tony was a member of the Committee to form the parish of Lumen Christi. He and another man were responsible for setting up the fold-up altar ready for Mass. Kay was with the Catholic Mum's Committee. They both marveled at the number of children who attended Mass then. Tony started naming all the families in McDonald Way and we added up the number of children. It was 26, just in one street!

Kay recalls that getting ready for Mass with three young children, necessitated preparation beginning the night before. The children's fringes were trimmed and the car was washed. Mrs Simpson was given a ride to Mass.

Their children went to school at Sacred Heart in Morwell. Three drivers- Mary O'Reilly, Ann Van Rhine and Kay, took it in turns to drive the children to school. Kay was often terrified driving the car in Winter as Monash Way would flood when Eel Hole Creek would pass over, as well as under the road near Acacia Way. She was sure that they would be washed away. But it never happened she says with relief. During that time Kay became involved with Sacred Heart School, hearing the children read.

Later after they moved from Churchill Kay had the opportunity to become an Integration Aide at Sacred Heart, to a little boy with muscular dystrophy. She fondly remembers the times they had together learning and having fun.

The early days of Churchill were remembered as days when nearly everyone joined in the social activities, reached out to help each other, bought things for families if they were going shopping in Morwell, offered a ride if someone was walking, baby sat each other's children and made helping each other a two way support. Churchill was a small community where everyone was equal and all were battling to improve the town. Tony and Kay say they had no complaints! For social occasions the Radford's always supplied the meat. Kay remembers organising a Dinner Dance at Yinnar with prawns three layers deep on the tables. It had never been seen before!

It was a great time in the Radford' s lives being a young married couple in a young town. They recall things that were done which they say would not be acceptable now with today's rules and regulations. Tony said "We were happy rogues having happy times". It was a busy life but a satisfying one.

Two further incidents came to mind. Kay says she took herself to hospital in a taxi when Michelle decided to be born. Tony tells of having a growth on his eye.

He went to work and cut up as much meat as he could before taking a taxi to hospital where the doctor cut off the growth. He then returned to work and proceeded with the rest of his working day.

Ross and Elizabeth Ollquist were good friends whose services were called upon several times for Michelle, who seemed to get into some interesting situations.

Once she swallowed a three pence coin and was going blue. They rushed her into Ross who called an ambulance and took her to hospital where it was extracted. Another occasion, she caught her toe in a hinge and needed Ross's help again.



sausages and mince steak and served in the shop. They kept a cot in the spare toilet for the baby.

Soon the family shifted into a Housing Commission house, at 42 McDonald Way. They had sheets at the windows at first, until Kay's Mum sent money to buy curtains. Kay and a girlfriend lacquered the floor. Tony's Dad bought them a heater.

The other two children were born while the family was in Churchill. Catherine was born in 1965, Jim in 1967, and Michelle in 1969. All three were born at the old Morwell Hospital, now St. Hilary's Nursing Home.

To start with there were few customers, although they had 29 the first day. Gwen Harvey, wife of Bert, came to help them decide if the sausages they had made were good. She bought 2 pounds, took them home and cooked them, returning to say they were good.

Kay was responsible for the banking of the shop money. This had to be done in Morwell, as the State Bank in Churchill would not deal with business accounts. She went on the bus with the three children, to achieve this.

There was no phone on at the shop until later. Tony's Dad died in 1968. Jimmy O'Brien came to the shop and got Tony, driving him to Morwell. There were no phones in the houses in McDonald Way either. Kay recalls that Tony was away for 10-12 hours with no communication link, something which causes no concern in this age on mobile phones!

Tony recalls they used to hide their sausages in the back of the fridge as they contained too much meat for the regulations. The Health Inspector used to come and check!!

Two dozen bottles of beer were always kept in Tony's fridge and were available to anyone

going, but Tony' s retort was that he couldn't see the yard as he went to work in the dark and returned in the dark. It was of no consequence to him

Tony was prepared to open on Sundays for people who had unexpected visitors and needed some extra meat.

Kay delivered meat in the pusher after 4pm, if people required. After they bought a car in 1969, Kay would parcel up the remaining meat of a Saturday morning's

trade, and rather than see it wasted, deliver it to families around town.

Families and individual customers quickly remembered include the Doctor from New Zealand, the Woodbridges who lived up in the hills, Mrs. J.A. Moore, The Farleys, Lindsay Willaton, Kath Tanian, Vi and Jeff Biram, Mrs. Bonner-Morgan, Mary and Jack Fox, Bill ??? who became a councilor, Isobel and Maurice Leeson, the Spains and Answerths. Tony and Kay were anxious to not miss anyone, but qualified that by saying it was 40 years ago, and were sure they would think of others if given time. Tony stated that the local farmers were great customers and supporters of the business. Kay would deliver meat to the out-oftowners once they bought their car. She remembers going to one customer and staying for a chat. But the headlights being left on meant a flat battery when it came time to depart.

Radford's Butcher shop supplied all the meat for the SEC Social Club Car Rallies. It meant staying up all night to make up to 3000 hamburgers and 2000 snags. They also had the contracts for the SEC Christmas parties. The Hazelwood Football Club was supplied with hot dogs. Hazelwood Fishing Club used Tony's scales to weigh the fish caught in competitions.

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# Looking Back..

During their time in Churchill, Kay was President of the Watson Park Kinder Committee. The committee organised fetes at the park between Fraser Crescent and White Parade, to raise much needed funds.

Tony became a member of the Churchill Citizens Association.

The Radfords moved back to Morwell after five years. Tony had received an offer too good to refuse. They took over the Milkbar opposite the Town Hall on the corner of Hazelwood Rd and Commercial Rd. Then Tony was asked by the SEC to close down Rockmans in Yallourn. The next venture was AJ Shoes in Morwell, Traralgon and Sale, with Lace Up and Button Up in Traralgon. A significant move then came with the buying of McDonalds in Morwell. This followed with the purchase of Traralgon, Bairnsdale, Sale, Moe and Warragul. They have been with McDonalds for 27 years. Traralgon is the only one retained now.

In that twenty-seven years, the Radfords have experienced a life which revolved around family, work and charities. Kay says they have been given a unique opportunity to be locals supporting their local community.

"It is no big deal to share and put back into the community which supports the business." says Kay. Their business has supported local football and other sporting clubs.

Their success with running charity events has been an example to others, and has also

involved them with other charities. It has given them a lot of satisfaction and enjoyment.

Kay was an inaugural member for Ronald McDonald Children's Charities, and also Friends at Parkville, for 17 years.

Balls were run at Crown Palladium with 1000 plus guests raising hundreds of thousands of dollars for the Ronald McDonald Children's Charities.

Tony received a Grace Award for outstanding commitment to the community in 1992.

He was on the Ronald McDonald Board at Monash, for 7 years. To be part of that board, you must own three or more McDonalds operations. This board caters for people who come to Dandenong area for cancer treatment. 82% of those were from Gippsland.

Tony and Kay received an award which

conducted them into the Hall of Fame in Sydney, in 1995. Only one operator per year is chosen. It is awarded for their work with these charities.

Tony also received the Ronald Award which is the highest award to be received in the industry.

For the last 6-7 years, Kay has become heavily involved with Rotary. She wears three hats. One as member of the Board of Management for Gippsland Centenary House, two as the Chairperson for Fundraising for the Gippsland Centenary House and three as Immediate Past President of Hazelwood and District Rotary Club. She was the first woman

to be appointed President.

Kay had been to a conference in the Western District and had called at the Ballarat Centenary House to see how is worked. On return she aired the idea by speaking to Ken Peake about having a Centenary House here in the Latrobe Valley to compliment the new Cancer Care Centre to be built at Latrobe Regional Hospital. Ken Peake was very encouraging, suggesting she take it to the current Chair of the Board of Management. The Board gave its commitment to this massive undertaking, backing the idea fully. Heather Beaton, Tony and Kay went to see Felix Pintardo, the CEO of the Latrobe Regional Hospital to also sow the seed of the idea. He thought it was an excellent move.

Tony was able to secure \$100,000 from Ronald McDonald Children's Charities, and so the venture got under way.

Ken Peake was President of the Latrobe Group of Rotary Clubs. He mooted the idea to them and they all came on board. The result has been massive fundraising events, with Centenary House now up and operating, assisting the patients and their families attending the Cancer Care Centre for treatment.

Kay and Tony are very proud of their three children and the success they have made of their lives. Each one has followed in their footsteps owning McDonald's outlets.

Michelle runs three businesses in South

Australia, organising balls with up to 700 guests and raising up to \$200,000 profit. Jim is in Sale.

From primary school at Sacred Heart they went on to secondary schooling.

Catherine went to Lowdes in Traralgon, Michelle went to Gippsland Grammar as a boarder, and James (Jim), went to Xavier College in Melbourne as a boarder.

Catherine is married to Darren Cowell and they have two children Kayla and Joel.

Michelle is married to John Walsh with daughter Kate, and Jim is married to Helena Li.

Tony and Kay have certainly put back much into their communities which have benefited greatly. They both say they have received many fold more for themselves by doing what they have done. There is a real sense of satisfaction by giving to, and supporting your community. But they have also enjoyed travel with McDonalds to the World Wide Conference in Monte Carlo, as well as to Australasian Conferences in Hong Kong, New Zealand and Fiji. These are wonderful occasions with up to 30,000 people in attendance.

It is lovely to think that this work began when they were part of our community of Churchill, as shopkeepers and residents. It is also great to know that Kay is still involved and supportive of our Hazelwood and District Rotary Club.

# Monash Gippsland Primary Education Interns on Display

The children love to come to school but it is different to the strict environments of uniforms and schoolyards we are used to in Australia. Kate will never forget the people and the children who were so welcoming, beautiful and friendly. Kate said, "I am returning to Rarotonga to visit everyone again. I ask you, who wouldn't want to work on a tropical





## Ann Harwood Retires after 30 Years of Teaching Service




# Musical Extravaganza!

# What is Graffiti? What Can We Do to Prevent it?



Graffiti is the marking of property with words, lettering, symbols or graphics without the consent of the owner, using materials such as spray can paint and felt tip pens. Most graffiti can be identified in the following forms:

\*'Tagging' - the signature or initials of the 'graffer' or 'writer'

\*'Pieces' - a mural containing a signature

\*Political or social comment.

Graffiti writing is practised by a range of people, from a variety of backgrounds.

The motivations to do graffiti range from seeking excitement or enjoying risk taking activities, an outlet for self-expression, notoriety and recognition within graffiti community, and identifying with a particular aspect of 'Hip Hop' culture.

Graffiti destroys property, is a crime, a form of vandalism, anti-social and a cost to the community, individuals and businesses.

#### Different types of Graffiti

Forms of graffiti include political graffiti. This is where there is an explicit political message of some kind. Generally this kind of graffiti originates from the grass-roots of individuals and groups who wish to challenge the legitimate or other form of political or economic order or specific government policies.

There is another form of graffiti known as Graffiti Art. This is a form of graffiti that tends to be well organised. The artists are skilled and are using this particular form of artwork to display a particular contemporary style. The works are not often done on public places and when they are done; the artwork is legal, with the permission of the owners of the properties.

Tagging graffiti is probably more prolific than any other form of graffiti. It is where individuals or groups will use a particular tag which may be a signature of some description, a type of a symbol or some other process which delineates the particular signature and identity of the graffitist. A tag may take as little as three seconds to draw and individuals may put up hundreds of tags in one day.

# Who is a Graffitist?

In Australia generally graffitists are male; vary between the ages of 15 to 17 with some writers up to 30 years of age. Those young persons between about 15-17 years of age will often fall into the graffiti sub-culture through association with friends, colleagues and family cousins and elder brothers.

The young graffiti artists often start off by tagging and drawing small pictures and small murals. The older writers, those up to about 30 years of age, have generally been within the culture for many years and even though many may only occasionally put up murals, some older writers are prolific in their activities.

What can NHW do to overcome the prob-

lems of Graffiti?

What are the signs or indicators of a graffitist?

\*Generally male, there are some female perpetrators, usually though they merely associate with graffiti crews.

\*Age 15 to 17 years

\*Proliferation of practiced graffiti, pieces (murals), tags, appearing on exercise books, scrap books and sketchbooks

\*Quantities of spray paint, 'texta" and marking type pens, particularly wide nib variety.

\*Marking pens that have tape around the top.

\*The presence of acids and solvents which graffitists mix into ink for penetration into paintwork.

\*Paint, acid marks and non-removable stains on clothing.

\*Balaclavas, hoods and black clothing and back packs.

\*Photo albums, scrapbooks, videos and CDs

with digital photos depicting graffiti.
\*Going out with friends carrying backpacks.

\*Out on the streets late at night unsupervised.

\*Carrying cameras, video recorders and digital cameras

\*Preoccupation with graffiti issues.

\*Visiting known graffiti Internet sites. These sites listed as "favourite sites" on browsers.

\*Collections of spray can nozzles from different types of household and industrial spray cans.

#### **Preventing Graffiti**

Graffiti has many negative impacts on its surrounds including:

\*Costs involved in graffiti removal to Council, businesses and residents;

\*Reduced perceptions of safety, especially when combined with other anti-social behaviour;

\*Reduced commercial activity; and

\*Reduced aesthetic value of the area.

Councils can apply the principles of Crime Prevention through Environmental Design, with vegetation, materials and coatings and lighting to deter graffiti.

These principles, shown below, are encouraged for private developments and redevelopments of existing buildings to deter or design out graffiti.

\*Use creepers and foliage along a wall to break up a potential canvas and make it less accessible). Ask your local nursery for advice on fast-growing or thorny plants.

\*Use textured or rough surfaces that make it difficult to apply graffiti.

\*Build with high-density, low-absorbency materials such as hard-burnt bricks.

\*Break up large surfaces to minimise the canvas available for graffitists.

\*Keep your property well maintained.

\*Ensure the site is well lit at night.

\*Use an anti-graffiti coating to protect the surface when building and/or revitalising the

façade of a building.

\*Paint the property in a dark colour.

\*Paint out graffiti to the nearest architectural oreak.

## Removing Graffiti

Two main options are available to remove graffiti from your property:

Liquid removal and painting out graffiti.

High-pressure sand or water blasting may be required for extensive graffiti as a last resort.

For the most effective results, graffiti should

be removed as soon as possible after the incident.

This is because:

\*There is less time for the graffiti to bleed into the surface material, making removal physi-

cally easier; and
\*Quick removal reduces the exposure time
for the work of the graffitist.

Materials can be found at hardware stores. Always follow the safety procedures recommended by the manufacturer. For further technical assistance, please seek advice from your hardware store or graffiti removal specialist.

#### Liquid removal

For painted and protected surfaces, such as wood, metal or concrete surfaces that have a top-coat. These surfaces are easier to clean because the graffiti doesn't seep below the surface.

Use a common solvent, appropriate commercial remover or citrus oil based product.

To find the most effective cleaner, always test a small area to start with, and gradually increase intensity, starting with detergent, citrus oil, methylated spirits, turpentine or white spirit and finally acetone.

For bare or raw surfaces, such as stone, concrete, brick, wood and metal.

Two removal methods can be effective on these types of surface.

1. Apply a solvent remover, wait three to five minutes then use a wire brush, rinsing with water to remove the graffiti.

2. For heavily affected areas apply paint stripper (to dry surface), wait three to four minutes, then scrub with a wire brush. Wash the paint stripper away, taking care not to splash it on clothing or skin.

For glass, plastics, and other synthetics.

Surfaces that have not been etched, gouged or scratched make it easy to remove graffiti. Most graffiti removers will work well on glass or a blade scraper may be effective.

Caustic cleaners should not be used on or near glass or aluminium.

Greater care needs to be taken with plastics and other synthetics. Consult a glazier or hardware store if necessary.

# Painting over graffiti

First, clean the surface well to remove as much of the graffiti as possible.

Aim for the closest match possible to the original paint or surface finish or paint the entire area

in a darker colour to deter a recurrence of graffiti.

Paint out to the nearest architectural break.

If bleeding occurs (seepage of graffiti through the new paint) seek advice from your local paint store on applying a scaler to the affected area.

Paint out with at least two coats of paint.

Always keep spare paint on hand. In the event of the graffiti happening again, paint out can be immediate and act as an effective deterrent.

A variety of coatings are also available to prevent graffiti from penetrating the surface. Please check with your local paint shop or graffiti removal specialist on products appropriate for your property.

## Video targets Graffiti in Pakenham

Senior Constable Helen Marsham, Youth Resource Officer for Pakenham, coordinated the making of Reckless, an 11-minute video, with Cardinia Shire staff, school children & ARC Publications. The film portrays the impact graffiti has on offenders, their families and relationships and the cost and impact it has on the community.

It will be used as part of an educational workshop for Grade six and Year eight classes and will teach young people about the risks and consequences of committing graffiti and criminal damage offences.

The new initiative followed a significant rise in graffiti-related offences throughout the

Municipality in recent years, with a majority of offenders aged b/w 12 & 18.

A small group of Pakenham Secondary College Year nine students worked with a professional director to develop the storyline. The film aims to develop young people's sense of pride and connectedness to their local community, teach strategies to deal with peer pressure, increase victim empathy and decrease the risk of young people becoming involved in criminal damage and vandalism and subsequently facing criminal charges.
