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

Jeeralang North Recovery News

Residents of Jeeralang North and district met in the early morning of Monday, 31 May, to celebrate the reconnection of the school bus route to its terminus at the Jeeralang North Hall. The school bus route was previously unavailable to Jeeralang North, which has suffered a loss of three homes due to the destruction of the February 2009 bushfire.

Four families were represented at this celebration, and six children left gleefully on the bus for the trip

down to their schools. Their celebration was shared with other children further down the bus route.

It is planned that a temporary bus shelter will be made available during the upcoming renovation of the Jeeralang North Hall, which was partially destroyed in the Black Saturday Bushfire of February 2009. The renovated hall will incorporate a bus-turning circle, and provide shelter.



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
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Latrobe City Council Budget – 2010/2011 At its meeting on 7 June last, Latrobe City Council accepted the recommendation of Chief Executive Officer, Paul Buckley, that the Council's draft Budget 2010/2011 be released for public consultation. The draft Budget places emphasis on maintaining current service levels while allocating additional resources to capital works for a range of projects across the municipality.

The proposed rate rise for the 2010/2011 financial year is likely to be at the lower end of increases across Gippsland in spite of attracting

an additional 0.3% charge to cover the recently announced increased State Government landfill levy. Ratepayers will effectively face a rate rise of 5.5% made up of a 5.2% general rate increase plus the 0.3% landfill charge.

Over \$43 million has been budgeted for in the Council's Capital Works program. Upgrading and maintenance of existing infrastructure attracts a large slice of the capital works spending, with \$15.5 million being allocated to roads, footpaths and drainage. Significant funding has been allocated to major projects such as the Moe Activity Plan detailed design, the completion of the Latrobe Leisure Churchill upgrade and the completion of bushfire related projects such as the Callignee Community Centre.

Other key capital projects also include the Moe Early Learning Centre, while implementation of various aspects of adopted recreational plans and other recreational liveability projects will benefit communities across the municipality. Projects include the Yinnar and Boolarra Recreational Reserve pavilion upgrades, the Traralgon West Sporting Complex upgrade, change room upgrades at Latrobe Leisure Moe and Morwell, and actions from the Skate and BMX plan.

A four-week period of public submission and feedback has now commenced with the draft

feedback has now commenced with the draft Budget being available for perusal on Council's website, and available from Council's Service Centres. The community will be able to make submissions to Council on Budget matters until Wednesday 7 July next, prior to Council considering the draft Budget for adoption.

Philip Parade Reconstruction

The tender for the reconstruction of Philip Parade between Balfour Place and McDonald Way was recently advertised, and Council will consider the recommendations on the tender shortly.

The project is required because the current road surface is failing. The works have been designed to enable the implementation of the Churchill Town Centre Plan, with a narrowing of Philip Parade in front of the Churchill and District Community Hub, changes in levels to enable a better link to Georgina Place, a focus on slowing traffic and improving pedestrian safety, enhanced parking arrangements, and improved lighting and landscaping.

In addition to reconstruction of Philip Parade, the project will include the addition of parking

between the skate park and Churchill and District Community Hub, and the first leg of the new alignment of Georgina Place between Philip Parade and Marina Drive.

It is expected that works will commence over the next few months, when weather conditions allow for the best management of the project.

Georgina Place Re-Alignment

The Churchill Town Centre Plan includes the re-alignment of Georgina Place between the traffic lights at Monash Way and Philip Parade, to provide a more direct and safer route. In addition, the newly constructed street between Balfour Place and Georgina Place on the west side of Woolworths supermarket is intended to be called West Place, which had been the original name of the access to the southern car park.

Part of the process of implementing the plan will include advertising the closures of the current alignments of Georgina Place and West Place, and their replacement with the new alignments. This will create new road easements for Georgina and West Place, closing the obsolete road easements that will no longer be used.

It is anticipated that this advertising will take place over the next few months.

International Students at Monash School of Nursing

ladies from Two young Huddersfield near Leeds in England are in Australia on a nursing exchange program for six weeks. Cara Fleming and Catherine Long are in their second year at the University of Huddersfield.

When they first arrived they were given an intensive week of classes at Monash including laboratory sessions where they learnt basic life support measures, taking blood (which they do not do as nurses in England), and oxygen therapy. They also did the theory of anatomy (the structure of the body), physiology (how it works) and medications.

Following this week, the students will go to Latrobe Regional Hospital where they will work on the wards, fulfilling their roles as any other Monash student would be required to do at that level competently and knowledgeably.

The School of Nursing at Monash aims to provide opportunities for students to get an international feel for nursing, through an exchange program.

Monash students undertake their exchange in the second semester of the third and final year of their education program, where the students have the chance to take an international placement for 4-6 weeks depending on where they go.

This year Monash has two separate exchanges; one with Huddersfield in England and the other with two locations in Sweden-Karalinska Institute and Jonkoping University.

This has resulted in eighteen Monash students going overseas and a reciprocal number coming here to Monash.

The exchange time is different for the students coming from England.

The benefits of this program are that it allows for an exchange of ideas in best practice, which will benefit both countries.

The students pay for their own travel and accommodation, but Monash covers their student costs.

The other benefit is that they have a chance to immerse themselves in another culture, which will give them greater experience of life and develop coping and independence skills, heightening their ability to adapt to any clinical situation. They should make excellent graduates.

Cara and Catherine have noticed some differences between the nursing course in England and Australia.

Their impressions of Australia are that it is a huge country and people do not seem to mind traveling long distances, compared to home where everything is close by. Roads here have much less traffic.

To come to Australia was a huge decision they revealed, with initial excitement at being selected to nervousness as time came closer to leave. Six weeks seemed a long time. They believe that the intensive program will make time fly.


Their aim at coming was to learn more skills and build on what they know. Both young ladies agreed it is a massive experience.

Email has helped to keep them in touch with family and friends in England.

The Monash Nursing staff have been very warm, welcoming and friendly, giving them plenty of support.

Without reserve, both students recommended the exchange program to other students, and those who may train in the future.

"If you have the opportunity you should go for it. It is a great confidence builder, and a chance to be independent, or become more so," both Cara and Catherine enthused together.

Saturday Breakfast with Darren Chester

On Saturday 22 May, 11 of us met for breakfast at the Co-operating Churches. It was a cold morning and we were glad of a hot cup of coffee and a bowl of porridge or Dick Smith's Bush Breakfast, followed by toast and honey or jam.

Our visiting speaker was Darren Chester, the Federal Member of Parliament for Gippsland. He has held this position for two years. He came from Lakes Entrance to speak to us.

A father of four, he has not always been involved in politics. As an 18 year old journalist he would not have thought he would eventually become a politician. He had been brought up with the idea that it was important that each of us do what we can for the community - even if only in a small way. There is the capacity in the community to help each other. This was seen during the recent bushfires with the number of voluntary helpers and donations to the recovery centers. As Darren thought more about community matters, he began to feel passionately about whether everyone was getting their fair share of tax payers money.

Darren had worked with Peter McGauran doing media work. When Peter retired, Darren decided to stand for the seat himself, and was pleased when he won. Now he finds he has become "public property." He may be having a quiet meal at a bistro with his family and someone will recognise him, come up and say a few words about what needs to be done.

He feels that it is important for the people of Gippsland to let young people reach their full potential. Unfortunately, in his opinion, there is a lot of dysfunction amongst families in the community. It is important for young people to have an education and to use their natural ability.

Darren likes to go to Auskick to teach 7 - 8 year old youngsters how to kick a football. It is a very valuable experience for them.

Darren went on to describe a typical day in the life of a politician - most of which is far removed from the small segment of Question Time on television when one side of the house yells insults at the other, all for the television cameras.

Darren likes working in his electorate, speaking to small groups and schools.

We found Darren's talk very informative and interesting.

Blessed Mary MacKillop, Sisters of Joseph

On Tuesday 18 May Sr Mary Fermio made Mary MacKillop a "Real Person" to parishioners of Lumen Christi and their visitors. Sr Fermio talked about the inspiration Mary MacKillop was to her fellow nuns, how she set an example by leaving the comforts of home to go into the country to teach and care for children and their families. There was a lot of hardship as the nuns were expected to live with families in the country and the only food they received was what could be scavenged in their surrounds.

It was much later when complaints came from families whose children (nuns) died of malnutrition because they did not receive enough food, that Mary would not allow nuns to serve in areas where there was not a commitment from the Priest or Bishops that they would provide enough food for their wellbeing.

Mary had very definite aspirations that the Josephite Nuns must live and serve in the com-

munity where they were posted. They lived in their community often in very primitive accommodation, with poor families as the wealthy could afford governesses or teachers.

Mary was loved by her fellow nuns as she did not expect anything from them that she was not willing do or give herself. Many examples are cited in "Memories of Mary", by those who knew her, written in 1925/6, for example, "Give those good shoes of mine to Sister - her old ones will do me well." "She visited us as Mother General and as always her coming was a ray of sunshine. She was a real mother." "After Mary's death a nun saw a picture of Mary Mac Killop in a shop and asked to purchase it but the man would not part with it - he said 'That kind lady, and holy nun that she was, saved my wife and me from starvation. She came to us in our direst need and brought food and clothing. She obtained a good position for me in a large warehouse and from that we prospered.' They were not Catholic." "One day a poor woman wanted some clothing and Mother took off her own underskirt and gave it to her. Financial matters did not cause her any anxiety, she would say, 'God will provide'." The stories go on.

Mary was firm about her ideals and expectations. One of her last instructions was, "A Sister who would speak unkindly of a priest I would not consider to have the true spirit of a Sister of St. Joseph.' This was after a bishop had excommunicated Mary from the Catholic Church because she would not follow his directions in setting nuns up in convents as was the practice of other orders. He pardoned her on his death bed. "Mary never gave up; she worked through issues full of zeal for the glory of God and the saving of souls, and devoted to the interest of the poor little ones in a special manner."

Sr Mary Fermio spoke about her 53 years as

a Josephite Associate and later a Josephite Nun. She explained how lay people can respond to the call to live with the "Charisma" of Mary MacKillop in our daily lives. This Josephite charisma is characterized by "Confident trust in God, faith and courage to risk suffering and failure, respect for the dignity of each person, simplicity of lifestyle, companionable support to the poor and powerless, inclusive hospitality, adaptability and flexibility, a practical approach to service."

Mary MacKillop will be canonized in Rome this year. She will be Australia's first saint. She will be known as "Blessed Mary of the Cross" as her suffering was great and based and modelled on the suffering Jesus went through, overlooking her own needs to serve God in a special way.

Lumen Christi Parish will have Sr Mary Fermio speak at all the weekend masses on the weekend of Mary MacKillop's canonization.

Messages and AGM Important Messages During May, the three groups

from the Churchill Pre-School located in the Hub, paid a visit to the fire station.

The first part of their visit took place in the meeting room where they learnt some very important fire safety messages including that matches are for adults, not children. It was re-inforced that they should hand any matches they find to adults.

A demonstration of cold water being poured over a burnt area if skin showed the children a very simple way to cool a burn.

Stop, Drop and Roll was another important message. The children actively participated in this using a set a hand signals to help instil the message.

Other messages included * Smoke alarms must have a working battery. If you hear the smoke alarm at night, roll out of bed and crawl low on the floor and go outside. Do not hide.

* If the room is too smoky and a fire fighter needs to come and find you to help you outside, use your feet to bang on the floor, your hands to clap, or your fists to bang on the wall to make a noise to help the fire

fighter find you. The children saw a fire fighter dressed in the breathing apparatus that makes them look like a frogman. They heard the fire fighter speak and realized their voice was different to normal but that they should not be frightened of the fire fighter who had come to rescue them.

After this inside session, the children were taken outside to see the fire truck and have a squirt of the hose. Each child received a sticker and the parents received two leaflets to help them prevent burns and scalds at home. The teachers were provided with some suggestions for follow up activities, to re-inforce the messages.

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

Stadium Notching up Progress Goals at Churchill Leisure Centre

The refurbished stadium at the Churchill Leisure Centre has notched up another goal with the completion of all structural steel work, and the exterior wall panels expected to be completed within the next few days.

In recent weeks the developing stadium has become an imposing sight from McDonald Way, located half way between Monash University Gippsland and Churchill's commercial hub; signifying another significant project underway in Latrobe's fourth largest community.

Latrobe City mayor, Cr Kellie O'Callaghan, said the works are expected to be completed in mid September.

"Completion of the stadium is eagerly anticipated. Some of the key benefits identified by the Latrobe Leisure Churchill user groups during the consultation phase were the fully compliant run-off for the three basketball and netball courts, together with the twelve badminton courts and three volleyball courts," Cr O'Callaghan explained.

"Completion of the stadium refurbishment will herald finalisation of all the major components in the \$4.6 million dollar upgrade to Latrobe Leisure Churchill."

Latrobe City councillor, Cr Darrell White, said the community has already witnessed key goals of the project being delivered with the indoor aquatic facility reopened in February at the Centre, following completion of its upgrade.

"This was delivered at the same time as the opening of the new gym

space which is almost three times the size of the old gym," Cr White said.

"Feedback from users of the new gym space has been impressive, with the new audio and visual cardio area, new assessment room, and some exciting new equipment winning accolades.

"The project will also deliver new change and toilet facilities, and to improve accessibility for all users, there will be a lift installed," Cr White added

Upgrade of the Churchill Leisure Centre is a collaborative effort between Latrobe City Council and Monash University Gippsland, with funding from Latrobe City, Monash University and the Federal Government.



The Budgeree Hall

A Building for all Occasions

The official opening ceremony of the Budgeree Hall was performed in 1910 by Mr Livington, a State Member of Parliament. It had been constructed in the same year by a Mr Thurley and apparently all the timber in the hall came from one tree, but it has been impossible to confirm this.

The opening night was very wet, (most unusual for Budgeree!!) and with no cloak room being available, coats and boots were scattered everywhere. Music for the opening night was provided by Tom Deering, Jim Elliott and Clare Amiet.


Over the years the Hall has been host to many social occasions, among the most notable being the Boxing Night Dances which were conducted from 1918 until 1962. Among the entertainers providing the music in those days were the Sloggetts, whose name was proudly emblazoned on the kitchen wall before its recent relining. During the late 1970 and early 1980s the monthly dances organised by Edgar Owen proved very popular also. During Richard Henshaw's term as teacher, several enjoyable film nights were held.

Initially lighting was provided by Tilley lamps, and later a lighting plant was installed with SEC mains power being connected in 1963.

In addition to dance evenings, the Hall has been the venue for many games of badminton. It has been used for roller skating and the very popular school concerts have been staged on an annual basis since 1942. These concerts, which feature a Christmas tree and the inevitable arrival of a jolly Santa, are the highlight of the Children's school year and are especially note-worthy for the splendid attendance they always attract.

The hall has undergone several transformations over the years. The stage, complete with trap door, which has been used for many enjoyable dramatic productions, was removed to provide space for badminton games. The chimneys which once adorned the rear of the Hall were demolished in the late 1960s. The back room was added in 1972, along with a new toilet block, which replaced those lost in the 1944 bush fires. The hall was restumped in 1978, the walls and ceilings were re-lined in 1981 and the kitchen was renovated in 1982. The Sire of Morwell has always looked most favourably upon any requests for financial assistance from the Hall's management committee and, in fact, the improvements would not have been possible without their help. A splendid example of this is the re-painting and re-spouting of the Hall. In this instance, labour was supplied by members of the local community and funding was by a Shire of Morwell Special Purpose Grant.

During 1987 the Hall became incorporated and now rejoices in the title of Budgeree Community Hall Incorporated. A grand title perhaps, but many a grand time has been had on the premises and hopefully will continue to be had.

Bush Huts Bernice van Rossum

Bush huts hold a story of the past, Of courage and initiative to survive With limited resources to draw on, The pioneers' built their huts.

They carved out an existence......

How hard they had to work,.....

Sitting in the huts you ponder On those peoples' amazing lives, And wish the walls could tell Stories of their life lived in them.

Tony and Bernice van Rossum have lived in Churchill and surrounding areas since 1973. They bought their first house, in Manning Drive, 'took over the book', and progressed from there to a property at Jeeralang Junction and years later to their new dream property on the outskirts of Churchill.

Tony's family came to Australia from Holland in 1952 to live temporarily with family members in Korumburra. Tony's father was a qualified physiotherapist who had to requalify in order to qualify for a pass to Australia.

His new trade of choice was to become a pastry chef. He got his first job at the Dutch Bakery in Traralgon, delivering bread with a horse and cart because he could speak Oxford English. Both his parents had a command of German, French and Dutch. During this time, his father would commute by motorbike between Traralgon and Korumburra every 4 days to be with his family.

The family moved to Morwell and later Traralgon, where they built a house in High street. Tony's father later worked for the Cement Works as an operator, which affected his hearing in later life. During this time, he taught gymnastics part time at both Yallourn and Traralgon High Schools. The indoor gym at the school was built to his designs some 40 years ago. He retired at the age of 65, only because the headmaster thought it dangerous at his age to do hand stands in the Roman rings. Thereafter he went on to do remedial teaching in the Maths and German departments.

Tony attended St Joseph's, St Michael's, St Paul's and Yallourn Technical College. He terminated his uncompleted studies in mechanical engineering at the age of 20, when he got a job with the SEC as a Chain Man, thus starting his surveying career. At a time when the family needed extra income to support a family of seven children, Tony got the opportunity to make a career change. With the support and encouragement of Bernice, he retrained and attended a 10 month course to ultimately become a Unit Attendant at Hazelwood Power station at the age of 51. Being involved with Tamboritha school camp for many years, Tony was offered a part time job to drive a school bus after retirement. At the age of 66, he is now driving school pupils full time. The family has 15 grandchildren.

His opinion on the future of brown coal power? China builds a power station the size of Loy Yang Power Station every 4 months running on Australian coal...

Bernice grew up living in various places around Victoria, in Sale, Ballarat, Shepparton, Melbourne and Traralgon where she trained as a nurse . She moved to Brisbane were she completed her training as a midwife and after marrying Tony in Queensland , both returned to Traralgon. The couple was under the impression that they may have to adopt to have a family, but was soon surprised by the arrival of their first son. They progressed to have seven children. Having lost her mother at the age of 18, Bernice found it hard to cope with the large family. Added to that, she also developed physical problems, which gave rise to depression. During this time, she experienced loneliness and rejection by society and many friends, which caused her to lose trust and confidence in her fellow man.

True to the fighting spirit and resilience of the migrants,



which helped them change misfortune to success, Bernice was not down and out yet. Much of her recovery was due to the support received from a parish priest at the time. She regained confidence when she decided to go back to work to help alleviate financial pressure, and she soon found that her fighting spirit had returned and her self-esteem was boosted. Bernice is due to retire at the end of 2010.

Gift of Life - Bernice van Rossum

Each day brings more new delights, Chances to achieve unrealized dreams, New food for thought and inspiration, And time for family and friends.

There are people, who need help, With sorrows and sad stories to tell, With tender care and a listening ear, They too can find life's gift of joy.

Both Bernice and Tony have fond memories of the days when the Churchill community requested and brought into being a Catholic Primary school before even having a parish priest in town. In those days, they would have 300 people attending mass. The influence of materialism, self-centredness, together with the eroding of community life and support, are seen as major change agents in today's communities, they say. Before, people took pride in producing and sharing their produce, today it is easier to go out and buy.

Bernice mentions the important role of ongoing education provided for caretakers by radio programs. Tony recalls how his father, after acquiring a Morris Minor, regularly took the family to explore the countryside. He also refers to his mother, who insisted that she wanted to see the whole of Europe before settling down to get married. On the other hand, getting married was a very important decision, which requires a lifetime of commitment. Bernice puts a high priority on the arts. Her grandmother was trained as a pianist and in light opera. Both she and many of her grandchildren are blessed with musical talents. She has also taken to writing poetry and various other handcrafts. Smiling, she recalls the difficult days when she would sit in the dentist's chair having treatment with a crying baby in her lap, several other toddlers surrounding her, trying to give instructions using sign language. This still comes in good stead on occasion when her children as adults need her confident inspiration. This certainly speaks of the importance of a strong family bond.

My Mother – Bernice van Rossum

As I developed and achieved, she encour aged me, She helped me through the difficulties of learning. And I learnt responsibilities and fun.. She taught me to cook, sew, knit and do it in fun. To always look for the silver lining in everything.

It was her love and training that got me through. She lives in my memory, with her words of wisdom. As a mother, I find myself doing the things she did. My children are grown now and I think back, How privileged and fortunate I am still to be here.

This is a family with heaps of wisdom and goodwill to share, as Bernice's grandmother did via "Jottings from Jill" when her family was in Sale. Their lives portray the importance of keeping the mind alive and active, reliance on faith, willingness to make continuous adjustments, and ongoing education and self development. Tony is involved with the RSL, as was his father, and Bernice is still looking to play an active role in Churchill's community life after retirement.

Street and Place Names of Churchill Official Launch

The Churchill Town Hall was the venue for the launch of Rob de Souza-Daw's book 'Street and Place Names of Churchill' on 18 May 2010. By 11 am the hall was a buzz of excitement as a large crowd gathered.

Amongst the audience were many family representatives of the names recorded in the book, interested residents and visitors who had come to the town for the occasion.

Henry Parniak of the Churchill Neighbourhood Centre began the proceedings by welcoming special guests, Cr Kellie O'Callaghan, Latrobe City Council Mayor, Graeme York, CEO of International Power Hazelwood, the Honourable Peter Hall M.P., Rob de Souza-Daw the author of the book, and the people gathered for the event.

Kellie O'Callaghan congratulated Rob on his work. The day, she said, was a celebration efforts of Rob's effort to provide a detailed account of the "fascinating history of Churchill's streets and place names", which people of Churchill have grown up with and see every day. She acknowledged the huge amount of work which was involved with such a publication by Rob, the community partners, organizations and individuals, which had resulted in the recording of a significant history book.

Latrobe City Council was very pleased to support this project with a community grant, she continued, ad access to archival material.

She referred to page 24 of the book where the Proclamation of Town is printed, and mentioned the controversy around the naming of the town, making mention of Tom Lawless and Max Cranwell. Both of these men have made significant contributions to the community over the years, and it good to see their names will be preserved in this book. White Parade was also mentioned for its connection with our present councilor Darrell White's family.

"I'm sure it will be treasured by many residents of Churchill and the Latrobe City community in general," Mayor Callaghan concluded.

Graeme York highlighted Rob's long association with International Power Hazelwood through his being part of the Environmental Review Committee, a nesting box project for native bats, and with another publication "Plants of Significance to the Ganai Community, of which Rob was a co-author. Graeme said this book will enhance and preserve our knowledge of our community. International Power throughout the world has a strong relationship with communities where their industries are based. This is relationship was evident between Hazelwood Mine and Churchill, which was developed to support construction of the power station in the early 1960s.

He congratulated Rob on his efforts saying he could not imagine how much work it had taken to complete. He flagged an idea for future street naming that when names are submitted, the ideas and reasons behind them be documented.

The Honourable Peter Hall M.P. acknowledged the partner organizations including Morwell Historical Society and Churchill Neighbourhood Centre.

As a parliamentarian he explained that he had much reading to do, especially over the weekends. The previous weekend he had Rob's book included in that material. He said he read it from cover to cover, finding it captured his interest. He found it relevant, saying that local history is becoming more popular, with people hunting out local history books in second hand bookshops.

Peter went on to explain the structure and setting out of the book, congratulating Rob on his thoroughness, commenting on Rob's 'hounding of" people for facts, contacts and photos.

Mention was made of the fact that Lindsay Thompson, Minister for Housing, made the recommendation to the State Government that the town be called Churchill after the late Winston Churchill. Lindsay's son Murray is the present sitting Member for Sandringham and would have loved to have been present for the day but was unable due to other commitments. Peter commented that there had been many fights to have the name overturned back to Hazelwood.

Peter thanked all those who had contributed to the project, commended Rob for his work and Carole, Rob's wife, for her patience.

Rob was invited to respond. He said he had had a vision of researching and writing a history of the area, which was refined to the history behind the street and place names, with a portrait collection to illustrate the work.

He did not set himself a deadline,

but aimed at making his work authoritative, bringing together local organizations and people for a cause - the desire and commitment to record their history.

Rob thanked the following for their work and support of the project:-

Over lunch many people purchased books which were signed by Rob and other guests. Many older residents of the area, shared memories and caught up with, or renewed old friendships.

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Churchill Gardening Group

Hello Garden Folk.

Well, here we are in late May and winter is upon us. Your vegetable patches should be well established by now, and even though successive plantings of the various veggies can be repeated every few weeks, your "originals" will be heading towards your table soon.

I am about to plant 'potato bags'. They are large bags with holes for draining with a few inches of compost and well rotted manure mixed with old straw in the bottom, and four 'seed potatoes' of your choice. Make sure they have good 'eyes'. Plant the potatoes and cover them with a good potting mix, by an inch or so. When the 'spuds' reach 3-4 inches, cover them with soil, manure and straw etc, and keep doing this until new growth reaches the top of the bag. Keep well manured and watered when necessary, until they flower. Then leave the plants to die down when they will, and for the 'taties' to mature. You should end up with a nice crop to eat a dozen ways and to admire vour achievement.

I do not have a lot of veggie space at my place, but I cannot stop growing veg. Hence I am making a 'snow pea topiary', with just a large pot, 4 Or 5 long canes, some good potting mix and a lot of hope. Just fill your pot - place your canes deep into the pot- plant your seedlings or seeds. Place in a nice sunny spot and water. Keep the soil moist and feed every two weeks. Oh! Tie the canes together at the top to form a 'teepee'.

Soon you will have lovely snow peas, or the type of your choice, of course! The flower garden at this time of year requires lots of leaf gathering from our beautiful deciduous trees for the compost.

Weeding: An all year happening and general maintenance.

Annuals always need an eye kept open for slugs, snails, and bugs, and the appropriate measures taken if needed. The same applies to the veggie patch.

This time of year is always good for planning. If you have 'shaded gardens', i.e. lots of deciduous trees, you can plan 'what' to plant 'where'. You could choose to under plant with daffodils, jonquils, blue bells, bromeliads, ferns, hostas to name just a few, with a view towards a mini woodland garden, depending on the size of your garden. If you wanted an all year round green effect, than azaleas (pictured above) are the perfect choice for colour and hardiness.

My friend and neighbour Thelma Davies is this month's celebrity chef. Thelma came to Australia from the Philippines in July 1983. She spent her early years in her new country in Boolarra until she and her late husband, Alan, moved to Churchill 15 years ago. Thelma and Alan had two children, a son and daughter, who both live in Dandenong.

Thelma is President of 'Alay Kapwa' the Latrobe Valley Phillipino Association. Part of her role is to promote cultural diversity and to foster cultural harmony. She enjoys the contact Alay Kapwa has with other ethnic communities, such as Greek, Italian, Indonesian, Indian, German and Nepalese and looks forward to the annual cross cultural day when all these communities come together to share something of their cultural heritage with each other.

Thelma's chilli chicken drummettes are ideal for finger food or as an entree.

Chilli Chicken (Drummettes)

Ingredients

1 kg chicken drummettes ¹/₂ cup chicken sweet chilli sauce (from the super-

market or Asian shops) ¹/₂ cup soy sauce

³/₄ cup tomato sauce

Salt and pepper to taste

Method

1. Wash the chicken drummettes. Remove the tiny feathers that stick out form the skin. Sprinkle with a bit of salt.

(b)

2. Mix all the liquid ingredients in a bowl and mix in the chicken.

3. Season with salt and pepper according to taste.

4. Put the chicken into a double freezer bag and pour in the liquid mixture. Be sure the meat is well soaked with the mixture.

5. Securely tie the bags and refrigerate for one night for a better result.

6. Bake for 1hour and 20 minutes at 180 degrees Celsius with the marinade. Turn the drummettes after 3/4hour.

Escabeche (sweet and sour fish) is a traditional dish, an essential part of the menu on all special occasions.

Escabeche (Sweet and Sour Fish)

Ingredients 1 large whole fish, cleaned 1 large onion, sliced 1 red capsicum, cut into strips 1 green capsicum, cut into strips 1⁄2 cup water 1tbsp cornstarch dissolved in water (optional) 4 cloves garlic, crushed 2 tbsp ginger strips 3 tbsp sugar Seasoning 1 cup of vinegar Pinch of salt

Method

1. After cleaning the fish, rub salt over it and under the gills. Leave for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour then fry in advance. Set aside in a serving dish.

2. To make vinegar sauce, combine salt, sugar and vinegar. Bring to a boil and thicken with cornstarch if desired. Blend well then set aside.

3. In a pan sauté garlic, ginger strips, capsicum and onion.

- 4. While fish is still hot, top with sautéed spices
- 5. Pour vinegar sauce on top and then serve.
