

### Happy Holidays!

Our last meeting for 2024 was on December 12. CDCA, like many organisations, takes a bit of a break over the Festive Season.

We hope everyone has a peaceful, safe and happy summer.

For months now, CDCA has been continuing to advocate to Latrobe City Council for accessible Council owned and maintained public toilets to be provided at the shopping centre.

Most recently we have been encouraging people to contribute to Council's "Have Your Sav" online consultation on the 2025/26 Budget. Council This community needs to tell Council that we want decent toilets at the shopping centre. Funding for the construction of new public toilets in Churchill, as per Council's own "Public Toilet Plan" for Latrobe City, must be kept front and centre if it is to be a priority for Council expenditure.

CDCA will attend Council's December meeting, at which Council will conduct its mid-year review of the current budget. We will be advocating for an allocation of funds now (for

# Churchill Neighbourhood Centre wins prestigious community development award

Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) proudly been recognised for its exceptional contributions to the community, winning the Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland Community Development Award, sponsored by Latrobe Health Services. The award highlights transformative Community Value Project, which has delivered over \$3 million worth of essential resources and services to Churchill and district in the

The Community Value Project, part of CNC's newly established Community **Projects** Resilience subdivision, addresses pressing community needs through initiatives that provide resources, support and household essentials. Despite not being financially profitable, the project has created significant social value, making a tangible difference in people's lives.

The initiative has achieved remarkable outcomes, including:

Delivering \$1.8 million worth of food through the CNC Food Bank, distributing over two tonnes of food every month and now supporting nearly 6% of the local



population.

Providing \$200,000 in social services, offering critical support to vulnerable residents.

Distributing \$300,000 worth of clothing and household essentials, ensuring those in need have access to basic necessities.

Central to the project's success has been CNC's partnership with the nonprofit Good360. Through this collaboration, CNC has been able to receive and distribute donations on a large scale, including pallet-loads of essential goods. These

resources are strategically distributed to other nonprofits and directly to the community.

The strength of this partnership saw CNC named Good360's National Member of the Month in February 2024, outshining some of Australia's largest nonprofits.

Nathan Brown,
Manager of the Churchill
Neighbourhood Centre,
expressed his gratitude for
the recognition. "Winning
this award means so much
to us. The Community Value
Project has been about more
than providing resources—it
is about building connections,

strengthening our community, and creating opportunities. To see it acknowledged in this way is incredible."

The award underscores CNC's commitment community development principles such empowerment, inclusion, and equity. By addressing growing needs and fostering resilience, the centre has strengthened its' ties with local organisations and residents, opening doors for further opportunities to support the Churchill and district community.

The Neighbourhood Houses Gippsland Community Development Award was presented at the organisation's Annual General Meeting on November 20.

It serves as a testament to the collaborative spirit and dedication of the Churchill Neighbourhood Centre team, their partners, and the entire community.

With plans to continue building on the success of the Community Value Project, CNC is looking to the future with optimism and a renewed commitment to making a difference.

# Friends of Morwell National Park


This month we had two events to share.

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# Plants in my Garden



By Mike Beamish Species:

Hibbertia procumbens Family:

Dilleniaceae

Derivation:

Hibbertia:

Named after George Hibbert (1757-1837), distinguished English patron of botany and a nurseryman at Clapham, London, whose herbarium was presented to the Linnean Society.

procumbens: A Latin word meaning procumbent, which in turn means sinking down or bending down, and which is used in the botanical sense to mean spreading along the ground, but not as closely as prostrate.

Common Name:

Spreading Guinea Flower Distribution:

Common along the Victorian coast, usually in open, sandy areas, but extending inland to the southern slopes of the ranges in Gippsland. Rare in NSW, only occurring around Mangrove Mountain, near Gosford. Widespread and common in Tasmania, in damp heaths and open shrublands, from sea level to the mountain tops.

### **Description:**

A dwarf shrub, prostrate to 20cm tall and spreading to about a metre or so. Leaves are up to 2.5cm long by 2mm wide, linear, leathery, flat or slightly grooved, green and may be faintly hairy. Flowers occur in spring and summer and are very conspicuous bright yellow, up to 2.5cm across, solitary and sessile (no stalk) and may be profuse. Petals are broadly obovate and may be slightly notched, around 20-25 stamens in four groups.

### **Opinion:**

This is one of the species planted in my garden when it was first constructed back in the late 1980's. I originally had two specimens, one in the backyard in the northeastern corner has since died off, and

side of the house, that has suffered some dieback in the past and has split itself into sections. According to the literature, this species is very susceptible to Fungus and Cinnamon other soil pathogens, so I am probably lucky that the plant has survived at all. The literature also says that this species will tolerate plenty of sun, but prefers some shade and some moisture, which pretty much fits the bill in its current location, although it can be tough to get water to penetrate the soil on the gentle slope on which it is planted. According to my records, I successfully propagated this species from three cuttings in autumn 2000, but have no idea where these plants ended up. One may have been planted in my Mum's Morwell garden, but if I am correct, the plant I am thinking of died a couple of years ago. I should give the cuttings another crack, showy species that deserves multiple positions in the garden.





A dot on the map Madeira.

Madeira is the main island of a small volcanic archipelago 600 miles off the coast of Portugal, of



which it is a part. The islands are all different peaks of a shield volcano formed on a transverse rift of the Mid-Atlantic trench. Their growth began five million years ago, and the uplift ceased about 700,000 years ago. The last volcanic eruption there has been calculated at around 6,500 years ago.

The Romans were aware of the islands and knew them as the Isles of the Blessed. They were inhabited probably by local Portuguese fishermen who settled there permanently. The Vikings visited around 900 A.D., and the Arabs from North Africa were also frequent visitors. The islands were claimed officially by the Portuguese around 1400 and became an important Atlantic port of re-supply of food and water for sailing ships going south to Africa and South America

and west to North America. Today it is a popular tourist destination because of its hospitable climate and cultural heritage, as well as its proximity to Western



Europe.

The local economy revolves around fishing, fruit growing and wine production. Because it is on the Gulf Stream it enjoys a semi-tropical climate, and its' geography causes it to have a number of miniclimates on various parts of the island, its' productive volcanic soil allowing cultivation of differing varieties of grapes. Parts of the island have up to 2,800 mm of rain while others are




much drier. In the early days of Portuguese settlement, convicts were used to cut through the rocky contours to form irrigation channels which still function today as water supplies for the drier areas and a source of hydroelectricity.


At different times of hardship, there have been large migrations Madeira, notably to British Guiana, Northeast U.S.A. and Hawaii. The British Guiana diaspora was caused by a serious famine in mid-1850s. The one to the U.S. was to cash in on the cod fishing and the move to Hawaii was the re-settlement of Protestants. It saw the introduction to Hawaii of the ukelele, a traditional instrument of Madeira.

The flag of Madeira features three vertical stripes of blue, gold and blue with a red and white Cross of Christ in its centre. Its capital is Funchal.

The first stamps for Madeira were overprinted Portuguese stamps in 1868. administrative name-







change saw stamps issued for Funchal in 1892. The Vasco da Gama omnibus design saw it go back to Madeira. The issue of the Portuguese Ceres set was used from 1928 to 1980 when Madeira was allowed to issue its own

stamps which could be used in Portugal. One distinctive feature of today's stamps of Madeira is the incorporation of the Cross of Christ into the perforation, making it quite distinctive.

Along with its sister

territory of the Azores, Madeira issues interesting and colourful stamps in manageable numbers, which are well worth collecting, an unusual occurrence in today's collecting scene.

Gippsland Water reminding customers to include an alternate water source in their bushfire plan, as the fire season approaches.

Reticulated water systems are not designed to manage the pressure of bushfire events and could be damaged by fire, and experience reduced or no pressure from firefighting efforts.

Alternate water sources could include water tanks. dams, swimming pools, wheelie bins or 200 litre drums. A special pump is also needed to draw water from an independent supply.

While leaving early is the safest option, those planning on defending their property during a bushfire should follow the advice of the CFA and be prepared for a range of scenarios.

If water or wastewater services are interrupted an emergency, Gippsland Water will aim to notify customers in several ways including SMS, website and social media.

# Hazelwood Cemetery

How people are remembered and, hopefully not forgotten (series continued)

In the Churchill & District News, November 2022 edition, a story was written about John Barton Hoyle.

Born in 1860, John and his wife moved from Beechworth to Morwell in about 1890. Both persons are interred in the Hazelwood Cemetery. He was a popular person in Morwell's fledgling particularly community, playing a leading role as secretary of the Morwell Patriotic Committee. In this role John was instrumental in organising "send offs" and "welcomes home" to those boys who enlisted for World War One. He played a major role to have a soldiers' memorial erected in Morwell.

It was for this intensive, dedicated community work that Morwell RSL memorialised John Barton Hoyle with a personalised plaque in the Hazelwood Cemetery.

Almost two years later, the story appeared again - Latrobe Valley Express, Wednesday October 23, 2024. John did not write the second story, he died in 1921. The original story was written in late 2022. All rather strange.

So let us realise, it is courtesy to have bylines; that is, printed text accompanying a news story, article or similar, giving the author's name. This small piece of courtesy should not be abandoned

Moving forward, over recent days, it appears there is plenty of interest in John Barton Hoyle's story.

My research has uncovered the following. Mary and John Hoyle's only child, Rose Catherine married William Neil Shaw on Thursday April 27, 1922. Their future home was at Hazelwood North. Both are interred at the Springvale

Botanical Cemetery.

William's father was Donald Shaw the first Morwell Shire President - following a municipal decision in 1892, the Morwell Shire Council was formed and Donald Shaw was elected President of the first Morwell Shire. He died on December 3, 1911, at age 79, and was buried in Hazelwood.

Donald Shaw had a cousin - Murdoch Macquarie, who stayed at the Shaw's Tramway Road farm for an extended period of time. Murdoch is buried at Hazelwood within the Shaw family plot along with other members of the Shaw family.

Lachlan and his only surviving brother, Charles and their mother, Margaret formerly Margaret Maclaine and widowed at a young age, were supported by Murdoch Maclaine's "protective arms." (Macquarie, Grantlee Kieza, 2019, p. 18).

Governor Lachlan Macquarie's sibling brothers were Donald, Hector and Charles - a Captain in the Black Watch. The Maquarie clan chief, Lauchlan MacQuarrie (different spelling of Maquarie did not seem to be a concern within the clan) had a son - Murdoch Macquarie, spelt McQuarrie on his headstone.

At age 16, Murdoch

was sent to India along with Lachlan - the future Governor - as part of a recruitment drive to maintain law and order in India. While there, Murdoch was promoted to the rank of Ensign although a colourful life ruined his ancestral reputation.


Grantlee Kieza in his book, 'Macquarie', p. 160 writes that Murdoch was in India for about 14 years. After travelling back and forth between India and England and Scotland, Lachlan Macquarie became Governor from 1810 - 1821. Somewhere Murdoch's history and his travels is lost amidst the volumes written about Governor Lachlan Macquarie.

Lachlan Macquarie was born on the island of Ulva off the coast of the Isle of Mull. Donald Shaw was born on the Isle of Mull, and together with parents Archibald and Ann and siblings - Marion, Donald, Neil, Coll, John and Jessie, left Scotland in September 1850.

In its' August 5, 1904 edition, The Ballarat Star's death notice told us that -

One of the earliest pioneers of Ballarat has passed away in the person of Mr Murdoch Macquarie, who died at the residence

of his cousin, Mr Donald

Wishing Everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year NOT OPEN CHRISTMAS DAY Shaw, Hazelwood, Morwell. The deceased, who was 84 years of age, was a native of the Isle of Mull, Scotland, being the son of the late Captain Lauchlan Macquarie. He was a relative of Sir L. Macquarie, at one time Governor of New South Wales.

He was a very early colonist, being one of the first arrivals at Golden Point, Ballarat, when gold was first discovered there. He went to Stawell in 1859, and resided there for close on 40 years, before taking his departure to his relatives in Morwell.

From Ballarat, Murdoch pops up in Stawell and was regarded as a highly esteemed resident of Stawell. He lived on Albion, a main road in Stawell near Reefs Road. He followed gold mining pursuits and worked in the Wonga and Birmingham mine. The Argus (Melbourne, Vic. 1848 - 1957) Saturday, July 17, 1937.

After a tragic mining accident in which he lost his mates - James Thompson 47 years old and Thomas Scott 50 years old, who were crushed to death by a fall of earth while working underground, it was reported that Murdoch was standing behind both men. Their bodies were crushed, one was reported as being decapitated.


Apparently Murdoch never fully recovered from this accident, and seeing his two mangled colleagues obliterated under a mass of clay and dirt. The Sydney Mail and New South Wales Advertiser (NSW: 1871 - 1912), Saturday, July 30, 1818.

Some years later, in about 1899, Murdoch moved to Hazelwood North and to Donald Shaw's farm.

Quickly returning to one of Donald Shaw's sons - Neil. He married Rose Catherine Hoyle, John Baron Hoyle's daughter, at Morwell's Methodist Church on Thursday April 27, 1922.

Therefore, by marriage only, Rose Catherine Shaw, (Hoyle) was in a very long roundabout way connected to Governor Lachlan Macquarie.


Due to heat, the day was drawn to an end early at 2pm with prize giving. Many young people went home with a fishing rod, tackle box, chair or accessories.

# Merry Christmas and Happy New Year

## Turmeric chicken



### Ingredients

4 boneless chicken breasts, 1 and 1/2 tbs of ground turmeric, 2 tbs of lemon juice, 2tbs of fresh chopped mint, 2tbs of chilli sauce, 1 tbs of butter/ marg, 1 onion peeled and sliced, 400gm can of diced tomatoes, cracked black pepper to taste

Toss the chicken breasts in the ground turmeric until well coated. Place the breasts in a dish with the lemon juice, mint and 1 tbs of chilli sauce, mix, covering the chicken breasts, cover and marinate for 4-5 hours. Preheat your oven to 160 deg C. Now melt the butter/ marg in a large frypan, cook the chicken breasts gently on each side for 6 minutes.

Transfer the chicken to a plate. Add the onions, tomatoes and remaining chilli sauce to the pan and cook over a medium heat for 5 minutes. Season with the cracked black pepper. Slice each chicken breast diagonally and then reform into breast shape.

Use an egg lifter to place the chicken on top of the tomato mixture, cover and warm through in the preheated oven for 20 minutes or until the breasts are cooked through.

Serve with steamed rice and/or a green leaf salad.

## Streusel loaf



Ingredients

(for the cake mix), 1/2 cup of plain flour, 1 and 1/2 tsp of cream of tartar, 3/4 tsp of bicarb of soda, 2 tbs of melted butter/marg, 1/2 cup of castor sugar, 1 egg lightly beaten, 1/2 cup of coconut milk.

Ingredients for the filling

2 tbs of melted butter/marg, 1/2 cup of soft brown sugar, 1/2 cup of granulated nuts, 1 dsp of ground cinnamon, 1/2 cup of plain flour, 2 tbs of breadcrumbs. Preheat your oven to 180 deg C. Grease and line a loaf pan.

Combine all the cake mix ingredients in the bowl of your electric mixer. In a medium bowl combine all the filling ingredients using a wooden spoon. Pour half the cake batter into the prepared pan and then top with half the filling mixture over top. Repeat the process with the remaining cake mixture and finishing with the remaining filling mixture. Bake in the preheated oven for 40 minutes. Remove from the pan using the baking paper to transfer to a wire rack and cool completely. This streusel loaf is delicious anytime of the year, it is also a great alternative for those who do not like fruit cake, just dress it with a piece of holly. Cheers!

# Fruit and cheese platter for Christmas

To an aliant

1 x 425 can of pear halves, 1 x 425 gm can of apricot halves, 200 gm of a blue veined cheese, 250 gm of creamed cheese, a handful of granulated nuts, a few fresh strawberries, a handful of whole pistachios.

Drain the canned fruit. Upturn the cream cheese and press the granulated nuts around the outside of the cheese, then slice diagonally into triangles. Place a triangle of the



cream cheese on top of each apricot half. Halve the pears lengthwise, slice the blue cheese into slices and place on top of the pear quarter. If you are using a soft blue cheese, spread into the hollows of the pears. Arrange the cheese topped fruit platter with a few fresh strawberries halved and whole nuts, decorate with fresh baby spinach leaves. Serve with savoury / plain crackers.

# Strawberry rice custard parfait



Ingredients

2 cups of ready cooked rice, 1 punnet of strawberries, sliced cross ways, 3/4 cup of desiccated coconut, 3 tbs of custard powder (blended to a paste with a little milk), 2 tbs of castor sugar, 1 and 1/4 cups of cream, (beat until thickened and peaks form), 625ml of milk (2 and 1/2 cups).

Place the rice in a large bowl and set aside. Heat the milk and add the blended custard powder and sugar. Stir over a medium heat until thickened and smooth, then pour over the rice in the bowl. Mix well together and place in the refrigerator to cool. When the rice custard is cool, fold in half of the whipped cream. Place a small amount of sliced strawberries in 6 parfait glasses or over the base of a glass dessert bowl. Sprinkle with coconut, then add 2 tbs of rice custard or more if you are using a dessert bowl. Repeat this process until the parfait glasses or dessert bowl are full. Finish with a layer of rice custard, finishing with the remaining cream and top with a strawberry slice. Serve chilled.

## Slow cooked Czardaz beef with caraway rice.

(Hungarian recipe).



Ingredients

1.5 kg of cubed beef, 1 cup of drained pineapple pieces, 1/2 cup of chopped celery, 1 onion peeled and sliced, 1 tbs of chopped parsley, 1 tbs of brown sugar, 1 cup of tomato puree, 1/4 cup of barbeque sauce, 1 tbs of Worcestershire sauce, 2 tbs of canola oil, 2 tbs of minced garlic and cracked black pepper to taste.

Caraway rice: 1 and 1/2 cups of uncooked rice, 1 dsp of caraway seeds.

Brown the cubed beef on all sides in a pan with the oil. Place the browned beef in the greased bowl of your slow cooker, add the remaining ingredients and mix thoroughly. Season with 2 tbs of minced garlic and cracked black pepper. Cover your slow cooker and cook on low for 4 hours. Near the end of the cooking time, prepare the caraway rice. Cook the rice in salted boiling water, till rice is tender and fluffed. Drain and gently toss the caraway seeds through the rice. Delicious.

## Pork crackle

Ingredients

Pork loin, leg of pork or forequarter of pork. This is my Christmas gift to you, perfect pork crackle.

Preheat your oven to 220deg C. Rub the pork rind of your cut of pork with salt until thickly covered. Place in a baking dish and bake until the crackling is crisp, then reduce the temperature to 180 deg C. Continue to cook for a further hour until the juice from the pork runs

clear. (check with a skewer). Transfer to a serving dish and keep warm. There you have it, so simple, so perfect. Merry Christmas from the Manor kitchen.

# Federation University student workforce ready

Gippsland's first physio students ready to enter the workforce

Federation University Australia students are helping to address critical workforce shortages in Gippsland's allied health sector, with the first local physiotherapy graduands set to enter the workforce in

Almost all of the 22-strong student cohort have accepted job offers Gippsland across beyond, well before they graduate from their studies, emphasising the importance of this course offering to the local community.

Bachelor Physiotherapy was launched in 2021 with support from the Victorian Government to help address local skills shortages, with the 2019 Gippsland Future Health and Community Services Workforce report projecting that the number of physiotherapists Gippsland will grow from 167 in 2016 to 237 by 2036.

For student Bella Fraser, growing up in a sports orientated family and training as a professional dancer first sparked her interest in physiotherapy.

However it was not until the COVID19 pandemic and travel restrictions put her dancing dreams on hold that Bella decided to explore a career in physio, applying for Federation's new degree.

"It was week two, day one and we were sitting in class, and the lecturer knew every single person's name," Bella said.

"The relationships we have built with all our lecturers and fellow students, you cannot get that anywhere else.

I have made some of my lifelong best friends doing this course and I have been able to work as an allied health assistant in physio environments while I studied, because of being in a regional location."

The pivot has paid off, with Bella securing work at Through Life Physiotherapy in Warragul as well as Warragul and District Specialist School.

Fellow student Rhys Chambers knew from an early age he wanted to work in the health sector and after studying a Melbourne-based degree in health science, he decided he wanted to study closer to home.

"In the end, physio

suited me perfectly. I am a social person who has been involved in sports from a young age and wanted to pursue a career where I could give back to others and make a meaningful difference," Rhys said.

He has now secured a job at Progressive Physiotherapy in Warragul, where he will begin in February.

"I am super excited to dive headfirst into the role. I had great experiences in clinical placement and feel like I have a strong foundational knowledge and skillset to enable me to enter the workforce."

After studying science, fellow graduand Malan developed an interest in the human body and movement and seized the opportunity to be able to study physiotherapy locally.

"The course broadened my idea of what a physiotherapist does, and it was a really personalised, supported experience because the cohort is not overwhelmingly large," Julia said.





## **Book Review**



Maya Lee is the daughter of Magda, the main character in this book. Magda believed the story of the Holocaust needed to be told and she sent written and oral material to Jewish museums all around the world. It is from these sources and personal recollections that Maya has written this book.

Magda grew up in Slovenia, a bright child in a middle-class family, who believed she had been blessed by a Rabbi and had a special purpose in life. She studied and became a kindergarten teacher, running a kindergarten for local children in her town.

As a young woman she got the call to register at a local venue to go to work for the Germans. With many other young women, she was put on a very overcrowded train and travelled for many days without food or water to be part of the "Second Transport" to arrive at Auschwitz.

Conditions were inhumane with prisoners being met with cruel and brutal treatment. Magda had been taught German by her father, so she was able to communicate with the guards and develop workable relationships with some of them. This enabled her to help fellow prisoners and at times outsmart the guards. She was put in charge of several of the barracks at various times, the most horrendous being Block Ten where experiments were carried out on live women.

Magda seemed to be able to get the guards to do favours for her, such as ensuring certain prisoners such as doctors and her relatives were able to go to the barracks where she was in charge.

Despite contracting typhus and having several narrow escapes she survived the death march and doubtless saved the lives of many women.

This is not a book to read for pleasure, especially in the current world climate. Like each of the books we have read on the holocaust, it is

There is no doubt Magda was brave and smart, but like all the other stories we have read, survivors possessed skills the Germans needed. Magda was a good organiser and she spoke German so she was useful.

As a character some of us were not able to warm to Magda, and felt the book read more like a curriculum vitae of all the positions of authority she had held in Auschwitz. It was not surprising to read that she had been accused, although found not guilty, of collaborating with the

The book concludes with testimonies from some of the survivors Magda helped during their incarceration.

# Bird book takes off

Saturday November 16 saw the launch of the book, 'Birds of Morwell National Park', at the Yinnar Memorial Hall. The book contains colour photographs of 106 bird species along with information about each one.

After welcome to country Aunty Christine who spoke of her childhood and the importance of birds, Jay Duncan talked about the origins of the book which was created by members of the park to help people spot and identify birds there. 'If it is in the book it is in the park'.

The guest speaker was Sean Dooley, comedy writer and broadcaster with a long standing interest in and commitment to birds of Australia. He is closely involved with Birdlife Australia and the annual bird count was originated by him.

His talk both was entertaining and informative, ranging from tales of his childhood initiation into 'twitching' to his year long drive around Australia in search of different species - he broke the record for the number seen and wrote a well-received book, 'The Big Twitch', detailing his adventures and the 703 bird species he had observed.

Sean spoke passionately about the importance of protecting remnant vegetation for birds species to thrive -'birds, like us, need habitat, food and family'. Connectivity between areas of remnant is vital so that wildlife does not get stranded and can flourish.

Sean stated that our nature laws are not giving enough protection to birds and other wildlife but he is thrilled about this book. He believes it will get people more involved who can then help to pressure the Government. He congratulated the Friends of Morwell National Park on their achievement.


The roads leading to Budgeree, Gunyah, and other centres are still in a deplorable condition, and the unfortunate settlers, who are obliged to travel them will be thankful when summer comes, and the mud and slush dispersed by old Sol (sunshine) who is the cheapest and best of road makers. Some of the trips to be frequently made by the settlers are really heart breaking to both man and beast. The unanimous opinion is that if the

idea of opening the country in scraps, and without provisions for a railway.

Mr Thomas Livingston was the parliamentary member for Gippsland from 1902. He was a dairy farmer in the Goulburn Valley before buying a dairy farm on the Agnes River in South Gippsland. Upon being elected to Parliament, he lived in Middle Park/ Brighton until his death in 1922, aged 71.

Based on his comment regarding a railway through Gunyah, Thomas Livingston was well out of touch with this part of Victoria.

Compiled by the most authoritative local historian we have ever known, Mr I T Maddern, those who plug history stuff on Social Media should make his work mandatory reading.

The next house was occupied by Dick Date, the blacksmith, and then came Mr Tatterson's residence, the dentist. Finally there was Tim Kennedy's place, on the corner, originally built for Miss Nichol, one of the teachers at Commercial. Road School.

Dick Date was in business in Morwell for many years as a blacksmith and wheelwright, on the Railway Station.

Returning to Morwell's It was advertised in the Morwell 12, 1915 that Sister S B. Smith and Sister E. R. Mathers, Certificated Nurses from the Alfred and Women's Hospitals, Melbourne, having taken Miss Townsend's private hospital, are prepared to carry it on; on most 'Terms Moderate'. This was the start of St Hilary's Private Hospital in Morwell.



Hazelwood North is an historian's oasis, if one digs deep enough.

On Saturday October 8, 1949, Hazel Jean Medew and Robert John Beasy were married in the Hazelwood North church. Hazel was the daughter of Mr and Mrs W Medew of "Devonlea", Hazelwood North. Robert was from the Yarram district before living at Hazelwood North. Hazel and Robert are buried in the Cobden Cemetery.

Robert's father, Charlie Caughey purchased about 100 acres for a dairy farm from Mr Thomas Fleming, who had formerly bought the farm from Mr Noble Tanner in May 1939. There is not much remaining of the Beasy farm buildings - although a dairy and hay shed stand stoically against Hazelwood North's changing industrial landscape.


### Apex at Mathison Park

display. This group rescues orphaned grey headed flying foxes. The author was privileged to see a one week old pup and a four weeks old pup; pup being the title for baby flying foxes. Last year around 400 baby flying foxes were orphaned in Victoria. This is an alarming increase from the average of 70 which occurred in prior years. Mothers are often electrocuted on overhead wires, which causes her young to fall off her belly where it drinks from her Most orphaned nipple. flying foxes are found from November as this is the birthing time. The flying fox is regarded as an endangered species. They are affected by heatwaves and man made causes like land clearing.

(www. littleaussiebat. com.au 22/11/24) The flying foxes' survival is crucial to the survival of the koala and other native species. Flying foxes are the pollinators of many plant species especially the eucalyptus. "No bats, no trees. No trees, no koalas".

Usually the Moonshadow rescue centre would not bring the grey headed flying foxes to a venue but they did this day because the pups required hourly feeding. The grey headed flying fox pups looked very content and safe in the special wrappings.

If you do come across an orphaned bat do not handle it but cover it with

## **BOOLARRA PRIMARY**



EWB (Engineers Without Borders) Incursion

On November 18. 2024 we had an EWB incursion, which was where four university students came in and talked about

Engineering. At the start, they introduced themselves to our class. They told us what part of engineering they worked on. When they had finished introducing themselves, they told us about how some people didn't have both of their arms or legs, so they have to have a replacement called a prosthetic. With a prosthetic, it helps you do things better. They all showed us what they look like and how it works.

Next, they told us our goal was to build a prosthetic leg from the materials they brought for us to use. Ms. Duncan split us into groups based on our skill level of different things. Once we were in our groups, we got a piece of paper and some money. The paper was for a plan and the money was to buy the materials that we needed. Our budget was \$65, and we could spend

that on stuff we needed. Once we had our materials and plan, we started to build our legs. We only had seven minutes, and it was stressful. We all practiced our teamwork, communicating and helping each other. It was really hard making it stable enough for us to walk on it with the materials we were given. All the groups were really stressed out because their plan hadn't worked out the way they wanted it to. Nevertheless, we all kept on trying until our time was up. We had to bring the legs to the front of the class and walked on the leg. We had one leg bent while the leg was attached to their knee and someone was supporting them. We all had very much
