#### **Hazelwood South Rainfall**

Ironically, Hazelwood South had good rain, just when the fire restrictions came into force. October had 98mm of rain, 20% higher than the monthly average. One wet month, make little difference to the deficit of the ground water, and the early start to the fire season remains justified. The time for weeding and mowing is here, if done well; the seed spread for next year's weeds is minimized. The rainfall deficit for 2025 is 14% at the end of October.

on business. Tension builds in the story as the dark side of the township emerges over the locking down of the logging site, when reason comes from an unexpected visitor.

When Kurt discovers that Miki has been leaving the shop while he is away, despite his efforts to keep her locked in, he is overcome with rage and the dramatic results of his revenge bring the township together.

This book received a mixed reaction from our group, but all agreed it had too many side issues.

Whilst the writing clearly showed the author's love of the Australian landscape, the story became unbelievable. The central theme for Miki, Leon and Max was the need to belong and the bullying and coercion they experienced, as well as the reluctance of people to intervene, even when they could see it happening. There is also a strong theme of conservation running through, both of old growth forests and the beleaguered Tasmanian devil, there is reference to drugs, a dabble in ageism and a stereotypical portrait of loggers as drunken perpetrators of domestic violence.

## Co-Op Church Snippets

#### **Coffee Connections**

The theme for October Coffee Connections was changes we have noticed in our lifetimes. The topics chosen were very varied and raised much interest and conversation. A topic like this is also a memory prompter for those sitting in the group. Choices ranged from pharmaceuticals, to bathing attire, to children's clothing, meal types, how places we knew as we grew up have changed, people doing needlework, (we saw some excellent examples)

transport and so on.

Shirley led our devotion which is re-printed here.

Change is an interesting topic as it covers many areas of our lives; our growth through childhood, adulthood and ageing. But one thing we can be sure about is that God never changes. He is there when we fall, our traumas throughout life, changes in family, schooling and employment.

#### Our Prayer

Lord Jesus you had many changes in your

life which has given us examples on how to face our situation and certainty that you hear us when we pray for help and direction. We have so much to thank you for in our lives; the changes you have enabled us to face and grow in your love for us. Amen.

**Bec** brought these following thoughts to us.

"When I was in Africa I had the privilege of walking and talking with a young man. His name is Theogen and he is a nursing student and a strong and dedicated

Christian. We talked mainly about God and prayer and then more about prayer, and about waiting for God's power before setting about doing anything. Theogen had an acronym he taught to me: PUSH, standing for 'pray until something happens'.

I find that the word 'power' leaps out of the text at me. So our verse for today: God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of love, power and self-control.

Think about the roles and the tasks that God has called you to.

Is there a gift that once burned brightly? Did you once go about your tasks with a divine anointing, empowered and energised but have now lost heart? How do we fan that back into flames?

God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of love, power and self-control. Are we losing heart? If so, what do we do, how do we come back from there?

Jesus says essentially (my paraphrase): 'You've got enough faith. It's not a lack of faith that's the problem. It's your attitude to obedience.

Our lives are not up to us. They are not in our hands. They are in his. We just have to obey. This is our freedom. Just do what we're told and stop fretting.

The thing we are commanded by Jesus to do (and we are told to do this over and over) is to love one another. It's not about us.

Paul says that the cross is the power of God. The ultimate symbol of someone laying down his rights, someone setting aside any claim to justice, someone offering forgiveness in the face of travesty: this is the power of God.

A self-disciplined stance helps us resist succumbing to fear. The power and the love also balance each other so that strength does not become harshness; and kind-heartedness does not give way to lenience.

Has the flame grown dim for you? Has power dissipated? As slaves of Christ, let us get rid of all those things that weigh us down and instead walk in the freedom of these words:

God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of love, power and self-control".

Ian had his theme of giving thanks

The themes of hope,

healing and giving thanks are taken further in today's Gospel. Here we have ten lepers who are healed. All of them are healed, but only one of them comes back, praises God and gives thanks to Jesus. This one was a Samaritan. The story is both about Jesus' capacity to heal, and about the responses that people make to being healed. Only one person, and this one, a stranger, an alien, a foreigner, returns to give thanks.

The story comes as a reminder that God's healing is open to all people.

God's healing is open to all who are suffering. The role of the church is to seek out the suffering and bring good news to everyone, regardless of nationality or background.

It also comes as a reminder about being attentive to giving thanks to God for what God makes possible. Remembering also the times that we would rather forget, the bad times the bad situations, giving thanks for those lessons as well. Taken from 'Worship Notes' United Reformed Church.

Cathie asked us to imagine a land where we only think about what we can do now for others; where we no longer look back to find a scapegoat to blame, but learn fromothers

to find a new way of living that will generate the happiness and joy that God longs for now.

We can imagine that land where people do not need to prove they are right to someone else, but understand we are all different. We can imagine that land of plenty where people do not need to take more than they need, but are happy to share what they have with those around them.

Last month, Latrobe
Community Health
Service (LCHS) recognised
Gambling Harm Awareness
Week, an annual campaign
that aims to educate people
about the risks of gambling.

The theme for 2025, 'set before you bet,' focused on highlighting the ways people can set limits when gambling to reduce their risk of gambling harm.

To support the week, LCHS hosted several events to showcase the ways people can set gambling limits, including setting a deposit limit, checking betting statements, setting reasonable time and money limits with the Your Play gaming card at venues, and taking regular breaks.

The events also featured available local supports.

One of the local gambling supports that was highlighted during these events was counselling—a service that Sandra Luxford has been delivering at LCHS for more than 14 years.

Sandra has worked with people from all walks of life: older women under financial stress, business managers who have lost everything, and young parents trying to break generational cycles. While no two stories are the same, many begin the same way.

Gambling starts as an escape from stress or trauma and quickly becomes an

overwhelming addiction.

Some of the things Sandra helps people with, include:

S o l u t i o n focused therapy that builds on small things that are already working.

H e l p i n g people find their own reasons to change.

Explaining how pokies and online games are made to keep people hooked, and the impact on the brain - it's not just about willpower.

Implementing practical tools such as self-exclusion programs, trying

new hobbies, mindfulness, or family activities to replace time spent at the pokies.

"Counselling is challenging but so rewarding. When someone tells me they have not gambled for weeks or months, or when I see a family smiling together again — that is what makes this work so worthwhile," Sandra said.

"The door never closes to clients; we are always here, ready to help, even if they have had a wobble and want



to seek support again."

#### **Farmyard Animals**

One of the first songs I ever learned at school was 'Old MacDonald had a Farm' which listed all the animals you could possibly find on a farm and the noises they made.

The difficulty was that the sounds accumulated as the song went on in the order that the animals were named.

The first was easy with only one sound but by the tenth you were struggling and it went on to more than that. They all had to be in the right order too.

At the school I went to, the animals were ordered by size from the horse down to the mice in the barn which made it easier but we introduced the odd animal to complicate matters.

remember Ι two dogs, a barking one (woof, woof) and Mrs MacDonald's Highland Terrier (yap, yap). Being a farming community the young animals had to have a separate verse for themselves so you can imagine by verse 20 it was a long song. There were arguments too over the correct sounds but you could always argue that your cow made the noise you made and the inferior animal of your competitor made some less favourable noise in your estimation.

We know that farm animals were once wild animals that were gradually domesticated to provide food or to work with the farmer to help perform jobs on the farm.

Originally, the young of the selected animal or bird was captured and fed by the farmer until they were comfortable with each other's presence. Over thousands of years, the animals and birds lived happily in company with humans and provided food, clothing and aid to make life better for the people and safer for the animal.

Depending on where you lived in the world different locally native animals were domesticated from camels to buffalo to guinea pigs to pigeons. Needless to say we did not have a verse for any of these but no doubt the local children there would have.

The animals and birds living on the farm were often seen as personal pets of any one person in the family, particularly if they had been personally raised to maturity by that person.

The bonds between pet and master were quite strong and the passing of a pet was quite an emotional time.

For that reason, few people had a pet pig who would meet an untimely end when the farmer fancied bacon with his eggs. On the other hand a dog or cat were popular pets.

Farm animals feature on many sets of stamps from different countries. Indeed a whole collection could be put together on each animal in a thematic collection.

However, it would be more fun for a collector to choose which animals they would choose to have on their own farm. Perhaps they could add a beehive or a rabbit hutch or some quails in a cage to add an exotic touch.

As usual, your imagination is the limiting factor.

## Road safety and YOU! ...

With the winter months behind us now, we need to look at the roadworthiness of our motor vehicles.

During winter, we tend to forget about tyre pressures and tyre conditions and headlights and tail lights that may have failed.

We tend to have the lights on a fair bit during the day and the globes do not last forever. It is handy to have a spare set of replacement lamps on board. Remember, if your headlights do not work, your car is unroadworthy!

Also, do not forget to turn off your fog lamps when there is no fog or extreme conditions. Make sure you have your vehicle serviced regularly, and drive to the conditions.

Also, around the Latrobe Valley area, there will be road works done to fix pot holes and other road issues left over from winter conditions.

Remember to stick to the speed limits when travelling through these work areas and watch out for workers on the road.

With the bushfire season upon us, we need to look at some causes for roadside fires. Our cars can start fires if you pull over to the side of the road and park on the long grass.

The exhaust and catalytic converter under the car can get very hot and ignite the dry grass and before you know it, a fire will spread into the nearby bush.

Inspect the underside of your vehicle to make sure that you have not picked up any inflammable rubbish that may cause a catastrophe.

Stay safe and keep an eye on your community.

Our Landcare Group has just found out that our 2025 funding application to buy acoustic bat monitors to find where our local microbats occur, was successful. This is a Victorian Landcare Grant. Our funding will also allow us to run at least one more bat workshop similar to the one we offered to the community last autumn.

To progress our bat monitoring project, we will have a new activity for any willing volunteers. This one can be done in your own time and in your home if you have access to a computer. We hope to find a group of volunteers willing to learn how to use the software programs that come with the acoustic recording devices so that we can de-code the signals that they record.

We need to start soon with this. If we can get people skilled up enough to use the real-time monitor in time for our next workshop in March, twice as many people will be able to attend the planned workshop.

The point of studying our local microbats is to look for ways to keep the population thriving. Bats can do so much.

They protect human health by eating huge quantities of mosquitoes every night; bats in farms and gardens can do the work of chemical pesticides - and at no cost!

Also, the fishing bats (Large-footed Myotis) that we found here this year are the only predator of the pest Gambusia (Mosquito fish) that threatens some of our small native fishes.

By the time this is published, we will have held our stall at the Yinnar Memorial Hall Community Market for the last time. We have been at the market for many years now, and it has been a great place to talk with people, give out information and sell some of our surplus plants.

I am sure we are not the only organisation that would like to express our thanks to the hall committee for working so hard to organise this enjoyable event over many years. We are sure that if you could have kept it going, you would have.

In early September, another interesting opportunity for group members was to join people from the Hazelwood Cemetery Trust on a bus trip around the Hazelwood Mine

Those who went were able to get an idea of how our local landscape might look once mine rehabilitation is completed. Thanks to the Cemetery Trust and Engie for this invitation.

November is when we need to get our seeds planted for next year's re-vegetation projects.

If anyone is planning a project and needs plants, this is the time to order them from our local native nurseries or talk with us

Until November 16 it will be FrogID Week run by the Australian National Museum. You download the FrogID map and record frogs calling. The app will guess what you might be hearing, and a human will review this and send you a result later. http://frogid.net.au/frog-idweek

Also until November 16 we have Australian Pollinator Week where you are encouraged to watch a flowering plant and see

how many different types of insects land in a small area over a few minutes. It can be really interesting to see what you get. https://www. australianpollinatorweek.org.

If you missed that one, you may want to join the Australian Bug Hunt between November 17 and 23. Unfortunately the organisers are using the term Bug in a more American sense to mean any type of insect. (For Pollinator Count the week before it was useful to understand that bugs are a particular type of insect. They are a bit like a beetle, but do not have hard wings.) Never mind. This activity wants you to photograph any backyard insects or invertebrates and post your photos to their iNaturalist address.

It could be a lot of fun. Insects, or bugs if you will, need all the help they can get with an apparent worldwide sharp decline in their populations. https://www. inaturalist.org/projects/bughunt-australia

There is one more have that we more time to prepare for and might celebrate. How International Bat Appreciation Day which will be on April 17 in 2026?



## Hazelwood Cemetery

How people are remembered and, hopefully forgotten (series continued)

After a lifetime living in Morwell, one's curiosity was piqued by being asked where was Alliss Street, Morwell? My curiosity was sparked and further research revealed more information.

A sign was eventually located, albeit a Google map shows it as "Crinigan Rd W" - that is, Crinigan Road West.

Anyway, Marion and John Alliss were early pioneers, selecting their farm land at Morwell Bridge. An accompanying map shows the proximity of their farm to other neighbours. Their son, George Sharp Alliss was killed in action while serving in France with the AIF 59th

Infantry Battalion in the Winter Offensive - winter of 1916/1917.

George died from gunshot wounds to his chest and thigh on Sunday July 23, 1916. Aged 39 years, George was wrenched from his loving family - J. Alliss (Norseman, W. A.), Mrs T. Wolfenden (Traralgon), Mrs W. R. and Mrs Fred Savage (of Moe, and named as his next - of - kin), and Mrs J. P. Kaye (Morwell Bridge).

There are descriptions of Flers/Guendecourt, where fighting occurred - "The mud was appalling, trapping men and foiling the planned assembly in

No-Man's Land. It got worse quickly. The mud was horrendous, limiting their capacity to move across the battlefield in the face

of enemy small arms and supporting fire. When they got to the enemy parapet, they were exhausted. Small groups of grimly determined men made it into some of the German positions and inflicted casualties, repeating the theme of 1916, they couldn't hold their gains and were forced to retire. Nothing had been gained for over 170 casualties".

George enlisted at age 38 years and 8 months, naming his profession as a "labourer." He was buried in the Bailluel Communal Cemetery on the same day of his passing. Mrs Fred Savage was sent his belongings; "his identity" they called it - identity disc, belt, note book, chain and watch and hat.

In September 1916, The Morwell Advertiser published two separate tributes to George:

"O what a moral lesson our gallant hero taught.

He knew the danger in his path, enlisted and he fought.

And:

John Alliss died on November 8, 1887, and Marion on August 3, 1907. It is sad to note they are both in an unmarked grave.

Tucked away amongst other graves is one in which Catherine Louis Smith and her husband, William are interred. (Apparently, William was sometimes known as Will, or Bill, wherever he and Catherine were living.)

On Monday November 22, 1915 at age 44, William enlisted for service in World War 1, serving in the AIF Army Medical Corps. Born at Corindhap, he enlisted at Blackboy Hill in Western Australia, while living at Boulder. Gold was famously discovered near Boulder in 1893, sparking the Kalgoorlie gold rush.

William listed occupation as a miner, mainly from him moving around distant parts of Australia.

The figures recording fractionally, Corindhap's population currently at approximately Australian Bureau of Statistics data gives the median age at 54 years. This rural village is about 35 km south of Ballarat and a few kilometres north of Rokewood. It is thought that the name was derived from an Aboriginal word which was descriptive of the place.

The village is about 300 metres east of the Frenchman's and Break O'Day gold leads, and the village was known as Break O'Day until after the mid-1860s. (Prior to then Corindhap was the name of the parish.) Gold was discovered in 1856-57, the most southerly of a series of mining areas stretching from Ballarat.

Within less than 20 years, gold mining had pretty much fallen off, but a large area of land had been selected for farms.

Blackboy Hill refers to a hill and former World War I training camp in Greenmount, Australia, Western the birthplace of the Australian Imperial Force (AIF) in the state. It was used to train over 32,000 men for active service, and the site is now a commemorative area. The name "Blackboy Hill" comes from the Western Australian grass trees, or "blackboys". The main camp meal was


It is approximately 600 kms between Blackboy Hill and Boulder - Kalgoorlie. Discovery of gold gave rise to the famous Golden Mile. William enlisted at the Blackboy Hill training camp.

His service took him to England and France before returning to Australia on March 12, 1918. William's service is recorded on the Boulder Roll of Honour.

After returning Australia, and with at least four dependent children, Catherine and William decided Gippsland was William their new home. died aged about 58 years, Catherine when aged 86. Mining was his life, either side of serving in the AIF Army Medical Corps.

As sometimes mentioned

in these stories, Hazelwood Cemetery holds a wealth of personal stories - of hope, of success and, unfortunately sadness.



## Health Hints

We have been hearing recently more and more these three letters RSV, what is it?

RSV, short for Respiratory Syncytial Virus, is a common virus that affects the lungs and airways. Most people get RSV at least once in their lifetime, often during childhood. For many, it causes mild cold-like symptoms — a runny nose, cough, sneezing, and sometimes a low-grade fever.

However, for babies, older adults, and people with weakened immune systems, RSV can become more serious and lead to infections such as bronchiolitis (inflammation of small airways) or pneumonia.

RSV spreads easily through coughs, sneezes, and close contact.

It can also survive for a short time on surfaces like doorknobs and toys. This is why outbreaks are common in childcare centres and during colder months.

There is no specific cure for RSV - treatment focuses on relieving symptoms. Rest, fluids, and keeping the nose clear can help. In more severe cases, especially in infants or elderly people with breathing difficulties, hospital care may be needed for oxygen or fluids.

The best protection is prevention. Regular handwashing, avoiding close contact with sick people, and cleaning commonly touched surfaces can help reduce the risk.

For babies at higher risk, such as premature infants or those with heart or lung conditions, doctors may recommend special protective injections during RSV season.

While RSV is common and usually mild, being aware of its signs - and acting early if breathing becomes difficult - can make a big difference, especially for vulnerable groups.



There was positive koala news in September with the announcement of a vaccine for Chlamydia by the University of the Sunshine

This vaccine will prevent the disease from causing infertility and other painful health conditions. (The Age 'Finally, some good news for koalas' by Bianca Hall September 10, 2025) Hopefully the Strzelecki koala population will be included in any vaccination program in the future.

The Strzelecki koala population of around 2000 individuals lives in the Strzelecki Ranges and spreads out from the Morwell National Park. It is the only endemic and genetically diverse koala population of koala in the state of Victoria.

The Strzelecki requires extra protections like the Oueensland, New South Wales and Australian Capital Territory for it to survive.

During spring summer the Strzelecki koala is exposed to increased danger.

Car strike and animal attack are more likely

because there is increased travel by the Strzelecki koalas. They are moving through or beyond their home ranges to breed, or like the juvenile koalas, beginning to live independently from their mothers.

We need to be more vigilant at this time when we are driving through bush areas especially between dusk and dawn.

Other ways we can help the unique Strzelecki koalas to survive are:

Be responsible pet owners.(www.sandypoint. vic.au "A Guide to Living With Koalas in Sandy Point" contains good advice.)

Have escape aids like ropes or poles in backyard pools.

Provide fresh and clean water especially on hot days.

Protect, preserve and plant Strzelecki koalas food and shelter trees like the Mountain Grey Gum, Blue Gum or Strzelecki Gum.

Let others know about the Strzelecki koala and its importance.

Join or support wildlife organisations that research or assist the Strzelecki koala, wombat and other native animals and their habitats.

Seek assistance if you see a sick, injured or dead koala, wombat or other native animal ring Wildlife Victoria (03)84007300.

#### Declared Fire Danger Period

The Fire Danger Period for Latrobe City commenced on Monday October 27, 2025. This means that there are no fires permitted in the open air without a written permit, along with most activities with the potential to generate sparks.

While CFA does everything it can, we also look to the community to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires.



Churchill Fire Brigade Captain Matt Fisher said that residents could find information about what is and is not permitted during the Fire Danger Period by visiting cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can or by calling 1800 226 226.

A written permit is required to burn off grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation during the Fire Danger Period. This permit may be issued by the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer or the CFA District 27 Office.

Please check with your municipality in the first instance.

Lighting a fire in the

open without a permit is an offence and can bring a penalty of over \$17,000 and/ or 12 months imprisonment. Barbeques and fires for cooking and warmth do not require a permit, but must be lit in properly constructed fireplaces (to view complete conditions visit cfa.vic.gov.

au/can )

Use of incinerators, chainsaw/lawn mowers, welding/grinding equipment and vehicles that come in and vehicles that come in contact with vegetation and machinery with an internal combustion/heat

engine is permitted provided conditions are followed.







#### **October Activity Report**

For this month we had two activities. The first was the annual Koala Count. Our group was joined by ten community members keen to find koalas. As the group met in the Kerry Road picnic area, Caitilin welcomed everybody and provided the necessary safety information. The walkers were asked to make decisions about which track they wanted to undertake.

Peter drove Tamara and Caitilin to Jumbuk Road so they could do some bush bashing along the Jumbuk Road track. Gordon, Darren and two community members walked around Stringybark track while Ken, Olga and the other eight community members walked around Fosters Gully Track. Some walkers went towards Fosters Gully so that they could complete two different walks over the day.

The first group to return to the picnic area was the group from Stringybark Track. They had seen three koalas and heard another and spotted another two koalas from the picnic area while waiting for the other groups to return. Tamara and Caitilin

The last group to return was the Foster Gully group which made slow and careful progress while Ken gave them many tales about the plants and animals observed around Fosters Gully. The list of the orchid species we saw during our Orchid Walk was: Mountain Greenhood (Pterostylis alpina), (Pterostylis Maroonhood pedunculata), Common Bird Orchid (Chiloglottis valida), Waxlip Orchid (Glossodia major), Eastern Bronze Caladenia (Caladenia transitoria), Pink Fingers (Caladenia carnea), Large Duck Orchids (Caleana major) in bud, Sun-orchids (Thelymitra sp.) in bud, Helmet Orchid (Corybas sp.)



#### Barbequed chicken with chermoula rub



This chicken dish is so summer and could be just the thing for Christmas. The chicken can be cooked on a barbeque or in your oven, either way it is up to you.

#### **Ingredients**

1 x 1.6 kg large chicken, cut in half and flattened (I flatten the chicken with a rolling pin), 1 lemon cut into quarters.


Chermoula Rub - 1/2 bunch of coriander, chopped, 1/2 bunch of flat leafed parsley leaves chopped, 3 tbs of minced garlic, 1 tsp of sweet paprika, 1 tbs of minced ginger, 1 tsp of ground cumin, 1 tsp of ground coriander, 150ml of rice bran oil, juice of 1 lemon, 1 tsp of salt.

First let's prepare the chermoula:

Mix all the ingredients in a medium bowl until well combined. Massage the chermoula all over the chicken and leave to marinate for an hour. If using your barbeque, preheat it to its hottest setting, or preheat your oven to 220 deg C. and line an oven proof dish with a light spray of cooking spray. Cook the chicken skin side down for 15 minutes, then turn it over and cook for another 15 minutes or until cooked through (test with a skewer inserted into the drumstick). If the skewer comes out warm, remove the chicken onto a serving plate and serve with lemon

### WELCOMING SUMMER

#### Honey pork with vegetables



#### **Ingredients**

375gm pork fillet, sliced into thin strips, 4 tbs of honey, 60ml of Worcestershire sauce, 15gm of butter/ marg, 2 zucchini, cut into thin strips, 1 cucumber cut into thin strips, 1 red capsicum cut into thin strips, 1tsp of sesame seeds.

Combine the pork, honey and Worcestershire sauce in a medium bowl.

Mix well to combine, marinate for 20 minutes. Drain, reserving marinade.

Melt the butter/ marg in a frying pan over a medium heat. Add reserved marinade, cook stirring until marinade thickens. Add the sliced pork strips and stir fry until pork is tender.

Arrange the zucchini, cucumber and capsicum strips between serving plates. Top with the pork mixture. Sprinkle with sesame seeds to serve along with steamed mixed grain/ rice.

#### Ricotta and sultana cheesecake



#### **Ingredients:**

500gm of ricotta cheese, 1 tbs of lemon juice, 2 tbs of vanilla extract, 100gm of castor sugar, 3 eggs lightly beaten, 1 tsp of ground cinnamon, 250ml of cream, 170gm of sultanas, icing sugar for dusting.

A favourite of my husband Ken, on what would have been his 73rd birthday today. Preheat your oven to 180 deg C.

Grease and line a 23cm / springform pan.

Combine the ricotta cheese, lemon juice, vanilla extract and sugar in your food processor.

Process until smooth. With the processor still running add the beaten eggs and cinnamon.

Process for 1 minute. Transfer the mixture to a large bowl and stir in the sultanas and cream. Mix well. pour the mixture into the prepared pan.

Bake in the preheated oven for 1 hour or until cooked through, check with a skewer.

Let stand in the pan for 10 minutes before removing to a serving plate to cool completely.

Prior to serving dust with icing sugar.

### Savoury avocado and lemon muffins



Avocados contain essential oils, vitamins and minerals which are so beneficial for our body's nervous system.

#### **Ingredients**

2 medium avocados, peeled and roughly chopped, 1 tsp of lemon juice, 350gm of plain flour, pinch of salt, 1 tbs of baking powder, 2 lightly beaten eggs, 225ml of milk, 4 tbs of rice bran oil, 4 tbs of butter/ marg, melted, 1 and 1/2 tbs of lemon zest, 1 tsp of cracked black pepper.

Preheat your oven to 180 deg C. Lightly grease a 12 hole muffin pan. Place the avocado in a bowl with the lemon juice and crush lightly with a fork, set aside. In a medium bowl mix the flour, baking powder and salt. Beat the remaining ingredients in the bowl of your mixer. Add this mixture to the flour mixture, stirring until nearly combined. Finally fold in the avocado mixture, do not overmix. Spoon the mixture into the prepared muffin pan. Bake in the preheated oven for 20 minutes or until the muffin tops are springy when touched. Remove from the oven and leave to cool in the muffin pan for 5 minutes. Now remove the muffins to a wire rack to cool completely. Store in an airtight container, these freeze well.





From Tuesday 9 -Thursday 11 September 2025, Latrobe City Council hosted the Gippsland New Energy Conference (GNEC) for the second year in a row, at the Gippsland Performing Arts Centre.

The event featured keynote speakers, industry panels, community sessions, and site tours of local renewable energy projects. Delegates explored key themes including offshore wind, hydrogen, workforce development, and regional investment.

The conference attracted 1,000 attendees from across Australia and internationally, including all offshore companies, manufacturers, and delegations from the British Consulate and the Norwegian Business Association, delivering a major boost to local businesses and shining a national spotlight on Latrobe City's energy potential.

Latrobe City Council Mayor, Councillor Harriman said the event was a huge success and showcased Latrobe City's reputation as a leading hub for new energy in Australia.

"The economic impact of GNEC was immediate - local hotels were fully booked, and thousands of dollars flowed into the local economy. Latrobe City and wider Gippsland were profiled across radio, television, national print, and social media as the centre of Australia's new energy future," said the Mayor.

"With over 200 speakers and 65 sessions, the event brought together industry, government, universities, and community groups.

"GNEC helped to facilitate business connections, provided targeted education, supported transformation, enhanced regional capability and attracted investment.

"We have heard that the conference provided a valuable opportunity to connect organisations like VicGrid with local businesses, opening doors for future partnerships across the region. VicGrid's Industry

Capability Network (ICN) Gateway page received 219 Expressions of Interest from local businesses within just 24

The event saw 1,373 local bed nights with an economic impact of \$771,659 and a Return on Investment of \$38 to every \$1 spent.

## Looking Back...



...through the eyes of local residents

#### By Leo Billington Local history with beards attached

In 19th century Australia, railway leagues were formed to lobby governments for construction of railways focussed on carrying produce to cities and ports.

On Friday morning September 2, 1910, about 20 representatives of five railway leagues in the Mirboo North and Bulga districts attended a meeting with Mr Alfred Arthur Billson in his Melbourne ministerial office. Mr Billson was the Minister of Railways, accompanied by colleagues, Mr Thomas Livingston MLA and Mr John M'Whae MLC.

There were two key reasons for this meeting on this date - to extract a promise from Mr Billson for the extension of the Mirboo North railway line to Balook, in the Bulga district, and then attend the final day of the Royal Melbourne Show. A record attendance for this final day was 55,000 people. Pressure to have an

extension to Balook never produced any positive results. But what apparently appealed to the Morwell Advertiser journalist at the time, was the "score of bearded farmers and settlers" who attended that meeting.

We must wonder about farmers "bearded and settlers." Were they different from "ordinary farmers and settlers? Were they an odd bunch who looked untidy; did they look threatening; did beards keep some warm during a cold Gippsland winter; did beards show masculinity; did beards show superiority; was there a shortage of steel to manufacture razors; were they just too lazy to shave; did their beards hide food from previous meals, yet still available for the next meal questions galore, and there could be more.

Beards, and moustaches, stand singularly proud in old photographs. Let us have a

Mr Billson's biographical notes say "A sturdy, jovial figure with handlebar moustache." Twitched at either end, his photograph shows pride and masterful command of his facial hair. Likewise for Mr Livingston and Mr M'Whae. However, theirs were not beards perhaps neatness and tidiness in high office was required.

It is noted that Charles Darwin even believed that beards were a symbol of power used to attract women, and he tried to prove that bearded men are better

at procreating. At other times in history, beards were considered unclean, even inappropriate.

Writers of social history believe towards the end of the 19th century, men embraced a fuller, and sometimes unkempt look when it came to their facial

accompanying photograph has been used countless of times - showing five local Morwell citizens seated outside a Commercial Road hairdressing saloon. John Caddaye, John Beaver Jones, John Flewin and Joe Buckley display their facial adornments. Being a portly person, Joe's white beard may indicate masculinity, whereas John Caddaye perhaps not. Actually, Joe was a Morwell Shire councillor for 17 years, and his full white beard perhaps symbolises his social position.

Another well used photograph shows Mr and Mrs Henry Godridge and three of their six children. Henry proudly sits, telling the photographer how to portray his masculine role; and with beard as well.

There are other examples beards seemingly displaying strength within their local community. George Bolding, who died in 1910, was a "mover and shaker" in the fledgling Hazelwood North community. William Tulloch, 1849 - 1919, soon became prominent with his building activities - hotel and residential - alongside a wide range of small businesses and spending time and money to establish the Great Morwell Brown Coal Mine.

After his arrival in the Morwell area, Robert Porter, 1839 - 1926, rose to prominence through his farming pursuits on a large tract of land immediately south of the then small township. Walter Edney J.P, 1838 - 1904, was active in local affairs. He was elected a member of the first Buln Buln Shire Council, and filled the presidential chair on two occasions. He was a justice of the peace for nearly thirty years and sat regularly upon the local Bench. He was a guardian of the local Church of England, and frequently conducted services in the church. He was also a member of the committee of Traralgon Agricultural Society, and other community groups, particularly with cricket.

Beards and beards, there are many more displayed upon our early community dignitaries.

However, moustaches "squealed out" for attention.

Captain John Hall's on Morwell's impact commercial centre and various community activites is well documented. Records tell us he was an upright proud person, keen to expand his business interests - and his luxurious handlebar moustache underscored his success. However to a point in his life as it is recorded Captain John Hall later fell on hard (financial) times.

Early Morwell businessman, Mr Thomas Kleine produced a droopy moustache as did highly popular citizen, John Barton Hoyle. It could be said John's spectacles made him look more like a school teacher or a family doctor.

Glancing back to Mr Billson, a really "clean cut facial appearance" was preferred, but with small handlebars. Mr Thomas Livingston MLA sported a "wrap round" and Mr John M'Whae's dainty moustache fitted his round face. Local MLA between 1938 and 1952, during which he held different ministries, Herbert John Thornhill Hyland's friendly trilby hat was enough to signify his importance to country folk.

Another example establishing personal prominence, two Morwell Shire Councillors, Martin Walker and D J White are easily recognisable in photographs.

The question remains for local history enthusiasts; did beards (and sumptuous moustaches) show masculinity; did adornments these show superiority?






The Federation University Emerging Artist Award has always been a long-standing tradition before the Art School's closure (2024), and a testament to the exemplary talent in Gippsland's contemporary emerging art scene, providing exhibition opportunities at arc Yinnar.

This year Latrobe Regional Gallery is proud to be hosting the last of the Federation University Emerging Artist Award recipients; Karen Zipkas with Reflections on Inversion, and Liam Maree Rogers with Still Breathing.

We are proud to offer a paid exhibition- at national standard – in our state-of-the-art gallery spaces, with full curatorial and technical support, giving the emerging artists a memorable start to their flourishing art careers.

The Federation University
Emerging Artist Awards

staff. Reflections on Inversion is a folio-based body of work developed in Karen Zipkas' last year as an Art student. This body of work possesses a profound connection to climatic advocacy, dwelling on Solastalgia, and the climatic effects that sought to threaten and overthrow/ devastate the forests of Mirboo North, during the infamous Mirboo North Storm Cell (Feb 2024). This exhibition presents these thematic concerns throughout a constellation of site-responsive artworks that were activated through the employment and conjunctions of analogue, DIY, and contemporary technologies.

A home-made trailer camera obscura conveys many of the artworks produced for this exhibition. The white enclosed box trailer (Van trailer) floats as both an adoration and tribute to the traditional practices, and analogue equipment of the pioneers of mid 1900's landscape photography, and the very physics that compose the practice of photography itself.

This DIY trailer camera

obscura stands as testament of a humble, upcycled mentality that seeks to be resourceful in a world that is driven by mass production.

Reflections on Inversion warrants an array of multi-dimensional and multidisciplinary works that span across drawing, analogue photography, sculpture, digital photography, painting, and video work.

Presented as a methodical narrative—part recollection, part liveliness - this exhibition unfolds like a journal of lived experience. It reveals the fleeting beauty that can emerge in the aftermath of climate rupture, fragile and momentary against the sheer weight and presence of absolute loss. Furthermore, inseparable from the collective grief that lingers—a sombre reminder that what has been broken will not simply heal but must be mourned.

Karen Zipkas is a Gippsland-local, visual artist and recipient of the Federation University Emerging Artist Awards (2024).


Some of the white paper chains will be used to make ghost balloons that will go on top of the roof at the hall.

Sometimes, other students across the school come to visit Murphy — or he pays them a friendly visit instead!


At recess and lunchtime, Murphy can be found outside interacting with everyone. He loves going for walks and playing ball with students across the school.

good morning."


Jeremy added, "Murphy helps keep us calm and helps other students too — and he's cute!" Theo said, "He's helpful and nice to have in the class."



The event, organised by the P&F group, aimed to bring children from all year levels together for an evening of celebration and connection. A small, generous group of parents volunteered their time to


set up, supervise, and serve drinks and refreshments to the children.

A petition calling for the state and federal governments to work together on the proposed **Princes Highway by-pass** in Traralgon has begun collecting signatures in the

Federal Member for Gippsland Darren Chester and State Member for Morwell Martin Cameron have joined forces to kickstart progress on the longawaited project.

Both MPs have launched a petition and spoken in their respective Parliaments about the long delays caused by congestion in the region's largest town.

"With 15 intersections involving roundabouts and traffic lights, it now takes at least 15-20 minutes to



"Providing a Traralgon by-pass would reduce congestion, improve safety and productivity, increase liveability for locals and boost the visitor economy in Gippsland. It would also create jobs during the major construction phase.
