# Churchill, Hazelwood-Jeeralang score funding for safety

At an announcement made at the Morwell Football/Netball Clubrooms, Churchill Football/Netball Club, Churchill Cricket Club and the Hazelwood-Jeeralang Community Association were told of funding to be received through Community Safety Fund grants.

Churchill/Netball Club received \$8,562 for installation of a new alarm system, deadlocks and external lighting

which comes on automatically.

The Churchill Cricket Club received \$2,753 for installation of a new security alarm system. Both these clubs have been the victims of vandalism and theft over a long period of time. Unfortunately, due to work commitments, Graham Harvey was unable to attend.

The Hazelwood-Jeeralang
Community Association
received \$10,000 for design

and distribution of a community brochure to strengthen community safety. This is to help address illegal activity in their area. Russell Northe commended them on their work and how, as a community they had worked hard after the 2009 bushfires.

In announcing the funding grants Mr Northe said. "I'm delighted to be able to support local community groups to help provide safer and more secure facilities for local people.

Minimising theft and vandalism is the aim of the grants. Our local organisations, run by volunteers, do a great job in providing a service to our community, and it frustrates me that they are affected by vandalism and theft.

It is pleasing to me that I can support this diverse range of recipients in crime prevention."



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October has been a busy month for the Churchill and district community with a number of local events and announcements being held throughout the month.

It was with great pleasure I represented the Minister for Emergency Services and Bushfire Response, Kim Wells, at the National Emergency Medal presentation on Sunday October 27, at Kernot Hall Morwell. Approximately 120 CFA staff, members and volunteers from across Gippsland were recognised for their extraordinary service during the 2009 Black Saturday Bushfires. Members from a number of brigades in the Morwell electorate received awards including Boolarra, Callignee, Churchill, Cowwarr, Morwell, Traralgon West, Tyers, Yallourn North and Yinnar South.

It was tremendous to see the Churchill, Boolarra, and Yinnar teams recognised so strongly on the day and I'm sure I speak on behalf of all the community in thanking you for your tremendous service during

this traumatic time and of course during the Delburn complex of fires that occurred in the week leading up to Black Saturday.

These members along with members from the Gippsland group of brigades provided sustained service and support to protect communities during a period of great destruction and loss. These award recipients fought bravely to protect lives and property during an extremely long and difficult fire campaign and I want to commend them for their courage and commitment.

The hugely successful Latrobe Relay for Life was held on Saturday 19 and Sunday 20 October at Gaskin Park in Churchill. It was pleasing to see over 890 participants and 39 teams pack into Gaskin Park over the 18 hour event including my own team called Northe's Naughty Nats.

More than 180 survivors and carers were honoured in the opening lap, the most ever. Latrobe Relay for Life was a wonderful opportunity for the community to pull together and

raise in excess of \$133,000 for the Cancer Council of Victoria in the fight against Cancer.

Well done to Janine Hayes, Sue Van Heurck and the local relay committee for their amazing work and success of the 2013 Latrobe Relay for Life. This is in addition to the generous sponsors, donors and businesses who provided enormous support also.

Great news in that three crime prevention projects in Churchill and district have received a funding boost as delivered under

the latest round of the Victorian Governments Community Safety Fund grants. Churchill Football Netball Club received \$8,562 for the installation of a new alarm system, deadlocks and external lighting whilst the Churchill Cricket Club received \$2,753 for the installation of a new security alarm system. Hazelwood Jeeralang Community Association also received \$10,000 for the design and distribution for a community brochure to strengthen community safety.

The Victorian Government has now provided more than \$2.8 million dollars under the Community Safety Fund to support 422 projects in local communities' right across Victoria. Previously the Morwell electorate has had many organisations benefit from previous rounds of the Community Safety Fund grants program and well done again to our Churchill and district organisations for being successful applicants under this round of funding.

I also had the pleasure of officially

opening the Yinnar Skate Park on Saturday October 26. The Skate Park was identified as a priority by the Yinnar community some years ago, and has finally come to fruition with financial and in kind support from a number of organisations including the Victorian Government.

The Victorian Government was able to provide the Yinnar and District Community Association with \$80,000 in funding towards this important project. Latrobe City Council contributed \$20,000 in funding whilst the Yinnar and District Community Association put in the remaining \$15,000. The Yinnar Skate Park has been established on the back of hard work and a vision by the Yinnar and District Community Association and a vision of many young people in the town. I commend the Yinnar and District Association and the Yinnar community for instigating the project, which will be a great asset not only for the youth of Yinnar but for the wider community.

#### Churchill Town Centre Update Northern Car Park

Construction of the pedestrian concourse between the Hazelwood Village and West Place shopping centres has begun.

Kerbs have been laid between the extended car park and the concourse, and crushed rock fill has built up the area to near "finish" level. A three-metre wide footpath will be built through the centre of the new concourse, and this will enable removal of the current footpath. Establishment of tree pits, lights and exposed aggregate areas both sides of the footpath will then follow early in 2014, and trees will be planted when seasonal conditions permit.

Reconstruction of the car park will take place in stages, aiming to minimise disruption in the town centre.

#### Taxi Rank and Bus Shelters

A tender for the new taxi rank and bus shelters along the realigned Georgina Place has been advertised. These will be constructed after the installation of new traffic islands which will simplify the layout of the car park.

#### **Churchill Town Hall Plaza**

Detailed designs are being finalised for the area to the north of the town hall. These include a footpath along Georgina Place, a ramp for universal access winding down the hill, establishment of the war memorial commissioned by Churchill District Community Association, erection of flagpoles, reinstatement of access to the top level of the town hall and improved lighting. These works will be tendered after completion of the detailed designs, anticipated to be in 2014.

#### Spraying for Blackberries

Early autumn to late spring is the season of growth and it is also the best time to spray blackberries.

Latrobe City Council and Landcare are urging landholders to ensure they treat blackberry infestations to protect the environment. The best time to spray is after the bushes have started flowering and are actively growing.

There are multiple ways of treating blackberry, including hand removal, cutting and pasting or using machinery such as a brush-cutter or slasher for a few years in a row. Using multiple methods is usually the best approach and having a "management plan" can act as a reminder of when to treat and re-treat the various weeds over the year.

Blackberries are a regionally controlled weed within Latrobe City and landowners have a responsibility under the Catchment and Land Protection Act (1994) to reduce its growth and spread. Latrobe City Council officers and

contractors will again be monitoring and treating blackberries on council's rural roadsides this spring and summer.

To be effective it's important that the

community works together to control this weed.

Agriculture, forestry and nature tourism are all important industries within Latrobe

are all important industries within Latrobe City which can be affected by poor blackberry management and landowners who fail to treat their blackberries jeopardise the efforts of the wider community.

# Churchill Gardening Group

Now that the days are getting longer and warmer, there is more time to do all those gardening jobs that seem to have been postponed.

One of the major jobs is care of the lawn, mowing (not too short,) watering, and fertilizing. There is also still time to plant a new lawn.

Pay particular attention to the watering of your new lawn, until it has established a good root system and is growing well.

The roses are still blooming beautifully; keep removing old flowers and this will give you fresh growth and new flowers.

Liquid feed the rose bushes every week or so. If you pick the blooms for the house, cut the stems as long as possible. A light summer pruning after the spring flush of flowering will encourage a second flowering into autumn.

Now is a great time to think of planting a living Christmas gift or a decoration for the Christmas season in the garden. Try hanging baskets or pots; maybe go rustic. Fill old watering cans, saucepans, even an old boot, but make sure that you have put in some drainage holes.

Plant in any colour scheme that suits you, maybe geraniums, salvias, zinnias or celosia, or for a shady spot try impatiens. My favourite for the garden with a Christmas theme are red and white petunias. If planted now, with luck the above will be blooming in time for Christmas.

This month there is no end to the vegies that will thrive if planted now such as dwarf or climbing beans, beetroot, capsicum, lettuce, cucumber, pumpkin, sweet corn, and the star of the summer vegie (or fruit)

Most tomato plants grow quite tall, and need to be tied to a stake, but there are bush tomatoes, that you don't have to stake or pinch out the side laterals. Bush tomatoes can be grown in the garden, but they also thrive in pots or hanging baskets.

Plant them in the best quality potting mix, at the same time blend in a quantity of controlled release fertilizer for fruiting plants. Place in full sun and keep the water up to the pots.

However to reduce breeding places for mozzies, don't allow water to lay in the saucers. Empty other containers of water that may be laying around.



This year I have had a few scattered Johnnyjump-ups (Viola tricolour) in my front lawn, they looked very pretty but unfortunately got mowed down with the mower. However there are many of them happily self seeding throughout the garden. Please remember to let the tops of the daffodils die down naturally, even though they do look a bit untidy.

Flowering annuals and biennials are a bit like the vegies right now; there is almost no end to choice. Just to name a few are Californian poppy, foxglove, for-get-me-not, nemesia, portulaca, marigold, phlox, salvia, snapdragon, wallflower, cosmos, and a lot of these will self seed later on.

Some bulbs that can be planted now, or are in flower, include agapanthus (cut off the seed head so they don't become invasive,) canna lily, gladioli, hippeastrum, and liliums. These come in many lovely colours, but I love the pure white ones.

Worm farms (composting worms) are now starting to eat more food and by chopping up the fruit and vegie scraps into smaller bits, (maybe with a shovel or the like), as this enables the worms to get through things faster. Tea leaves, coffee grounds, hair, crushed egg shells, and sweepings from the floor are all consumed with glee. Also, adding a bit of lime to the worm farm stops any chance of smells.

That's all for this month. Enjoy your garden, be it big or small.

This happened in Alexanders Road Morwell on Monday October 28. He did not give his name but I was very grateful for his thoughtfulness.





## "North East Passage, a Modern Voyage of Discovery"



An illustrated talk about the "North East Passage, a Modern Voyage of Discovery" will be given by Julie Parker on Friday November 22, at the Latrobe Valley Field Naturalists' Club meeting.

The 26 day voyage Julie joined in August 2011, was the first general interest trip for which the Russian authorities had given permission in recent times.

Setting off from the ice free port of Murmansk, the vessel Akademik Shokalskiy traversed the north east passage through 9 time zones, 6 seas and 4,411 nautical miles crossing the Russian arctic to finish in the Bering Strait town of Anadyr.

Julie's presentation will cover the wildlife, plants, islands and indigenous people encountered on this modern day expedition.



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**Gippsland brigade members** receive national recognition for Black Saturday service

Brigade members from across the three CFA Districts in Gippsland gathered at Kernot Hall in Morwell to receive the National Emergency Medal presented by Russell Northe and congratulated by Chief CFA Officer Euan Ferguson AFSM on Sunday afternoon October 27. It was a very well organised and moving event.

Also in attendance from CFA were Regional Director Mark Potter and CFA Board member Michael Freshwater. According to material given to recipients on the day we have the following information about the medal.

"In October 2011, the National Emergency Medal was added to the Australian Honours and Awards. It recognises service to others during nationally significant emergencies.

The 2009 Victorian bushfires have been declared a nationally significant emergency and members of CFA who rendered service during the specified dates of these fires are eligible for the medal. 120 members both volunteers


and Gippsland Regional personnel were recognised.

The decoration consists of a circular bronze medal with a stylised representation of Australia's floral emblem, the wattle, in the centre. The ring around the central image is of flowering wattle, representing accomplishments and sacrifices made by Australians in the service of others in times of crisis. The back of the medal repeats the ring of flowering wattle, and details the award and recipient.

The colours of the ribbon match the colours of the Humanitarian Overseas Service Medal ribbongold and eucalyptus green. Gold symbolises the Australian sun, optimism and hope. Eucalyptus green complements the symbolism of the medal design. The seven gold coloured bands represent Australia's six states, with the seventh representing the territories."





# 20th Birthday Celebration of **Greenside Villas, Yinnar**



At this date only 5 units were available but now have 4 rental one bedroom units and 7, 2 bedrooms leased units that now make up Greenside Villas Retirement Village.


The day was marked with an afternoon tea in Centennial Park, Yinnar which is next door to the village. About 40 people attended including Kathy Thornton who was the first of residents. It was lovely to see some of the residents who had recently moved to residential care in Morwell attending as well as some of the Yinnar community. There was lots of chatting and all enjoyed the wonderful afternoon tea provided.

President of Yinnar and District Housing, Graeme O'Hara welcomed everyone and spoke of original residents and committee and of the hard work it took the community of Yinnar to plan and build these original units.

Ray Linton who was the person responsible for the initial idea in 1990 spoke of how the community got together to request the Morwell Shire consider this project on the vacant land next to the bowling club. The idea was to provide low cost housing for the elderly persons of Yinnar and District. Prior to the building of these units, Yinnar residents had to leave their families and friends when they were no longer able to manage their larger homes and were requiring independent aged care.

Yinnar and District Housing Development was formed from members of the local community to oversee the building and the ongoing management of these units. Local architect, John Fowler designed and also managed the project, bringing the building of units in on budget.

Brigade Officers were thanked for their role, and asked to continue their good work, indeed, being asked to take on some practical leadership and development to build Churchill brigade's, and the Morwell Group's, operational capabilities.

He concluded by saying how deeply proud he was of everything done this past year by the brigade.

Chief Officer Euan Ferguson AFSM spoke saying it was a pleasure to be back in the area where he had previously served; it was like being amongst old friends again.

He thanked all brigade members present for their ongoing work and commitment to the community.

"This weekend, we are together 'relaying' to remember loved ones we've lost to cancer, to celebrate life and to fight back for a cancer free world."

Sue thanked everyone for all their efforts which are making such a difference to the research, especially in the forgotten cancers, being done by the Cancer Council, which in turn is being able to help those who are regularly diagnosed with cancer. There are 70 relay events across Victoria now, and it has grown across the world.

Member for Morwell, Russell Northe, Patron of this Relay for Life, thanked all there for their efforts and wished everyone a great Relay event, in which he also participated.

#### Look Good, Feel Better.

Marion Answerth, Regional Victorian Volunteer of the Year, for "Look Good, Feel Better" spoke about the program and how it has made such a difference to women, and lately men, suffering the effects of cancer treatment. Her training in skin care and colour cosmetics qualified her to participate in this program. Marion was able to help them look better and thus feel better with the application of make- up and wigs. This program, founded in the USA, has helped many women maintain self-esteem and face cancer treatment with greater confidence, often alleviating depressive

feelings.

In 2012, 100,000 participants had accessed the program here in Australia. It is funded by the cosmetic and beauty industry, providing nearly 1000 workshops every year. Locally workshops are held at Bairnsdale, Sale, Traralgon, Warragul and Leongatha.

At workshops attendees are led step by step through the skin care section and then see demonstrated, the use of cosmetics. Each lady receives a confidence pack to the value of \$400 to take home. Marion then demonstrates hats, turbans, scarves, before a hairdresser shows how wigs can be used advantageously. Transformations are seen.

A Dream Ball is held annually to raise funds. Kerri-Anne Kennerly is the patron.

#### **Cancer Facts**

Christine Loulier for the Cancer Council made all present aware of the horrific statistics concerned with cancer.

Each year 412 people are diagnosed with cancer in Latrobe City. One in two Australians will be diagnosed with cancer by age 85. Five year survival is now 65%, the highest ever. Two decades ago this figure was 47%. There have been many breakthroughs in early detection, prevention and treatment.

Last year the Cancer Council led a world first study into 15 cancers that are less common, but have lower survival rates, including bladder, multiple myeloma, and kidney.

In Latrobe there is a cancer Council supported Helpline, trained volunteers and a face to face Carer Support Group, as well as supporting clinical trials in hospitals across Victoria, testing new treatments.

Quitline and SunSmart are two active and successful programs run by the Cancer Council. Christine emphasised the importance of Slip Slop Slap.



#### **Survivors and Carers Walk**

Marion Answerth cut the ribbon then the survivors and carers did their lap of honour, being clapped enthusiastically by the crowd, before being served afternoon tea.



The afternoon tea, with a little help from supporters, was provided largely by the Moe and District Cancer Council Volunteer Group, also known as the Bad Hair Day Girls.

#### The Teams.

There were thirty-eight teams which participated in the 11th Relay for Life in Latrobe- (900 people). Some were new this year; others have been with Relay for a long time. The reasons people join in varies greatly from 'I thought it would be fun' to 'I lost my relative/friend to cancer, and want to help the fight to find a cure' to 'Everyone is affected by cancer'.

Each team was required to produce a banner using the word Hope.



Flannelette Roses came for their second year. They sold roses and glow sticks on the day but had raised \$4,200 with more coming, prior to the day. They were hoping to raise \$5000 so they could choose a research project to fund. They had run a disco at Hazelwood North Primary School too.

Top Gear. This was their first year. Pat Ryan of Lumen Christi School organised his family, friends and school to raise \$2000+ through a BBQ at school (\$500) and selling chocolates (\$1,500).

Pink Power. The team raised \$3,527.60 with a cake stall, business sponsorship a morning tea and bright colours day at Grey St Primary School and at the footy and netball finals.



Valley Angels raised \$400 at work selling things they had made. They also had glow in the dark items to sell for the night activities. Stalls, art, shopping centres and collection boxes at home, a competition to guess the number of lollies in the jar, seeking sponsors and collecting money all contributed to their total amount.



Churchill Champions raised \$2,000. This year their team had swelled to eighteen members. They held a 'Ladies Night In' event which was very successful, received contributions from Ritchie's Community Benefits, Shantelle sold Hot Chocolate sticks from the salon, and a cake stall at the Fun Day netted \$160.



Boolarra Stompers raised \$5,000 with a pie drive, Easter, Christmas, and Mothers Day raffles, participating in Shave for a Cure, having a donation box on the Boolarra Post Office counter and bringing in veggies, flowers, books and plants to sell.



Witches in Stitches. Their fundraiser was the raffle of a quilt they had made. Over 700 tickets were sold. Overall they raised \$1,800. They had a good time and enjoyed the atmosphere and the fun of the activities, which make the time seem to fly and kept them motivated. Their tent was dressed as a witch's den. On a clothesline outside they had decorated jocks- a reminder to the men to be pro-active in checking for prostate cancer. The teenage members of the team came second in the talent quest and Jye dressed as Miss Relay. "There is something special about walking at 4am and then seeing the beautiful sunrise," reported Wendy, team captain. The team congratulates the organising committee. They will be back next year.



MisPrints team were from Gippsland Trade Printers and they raised nearly \$10,000.

Their Community Fun Day was a terrific success

Many fun activities were held throughout the afternoon and night and into Sunday. They included a watermelon eating competition, apple bobbing, 3 leg races, scavenger hunt, quiz, weird hat parade, and Midnight Miss Relay (blokes as girls event).

The event closed with the unveiling of a banner 23 metres long on which participants had written their pledges to cut their cancer risk during the next twelve months.

Sue Van Heurk praised the Relay as the one which had broken all the records- highest amount raised- \$123,264, highest number of participants 900 people and survivors and carers 150+, with the most teams-38. It certainly puts a challenge out to better that for next year's event.

Already 17 teams have registered to compete in 2014.

# Pre-Primary students join Churchill art pathway



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The Art and Culture Pathway instigated by the Gippsland Education Precinct (GEP) has seen the transformation of parts of Churchill with its bright colour and youth engagement.

The Kurnai students under the guidance of artist John Vukovic, have begun to add geometric designs with added symbols, to the skate park. The Bug Blitz team with the help of primary school children of Churchill decorated the totem poles at the northern end of the Green Inc ponds while discovering bugs in the area.

Sue Scarlett, director at the Hub Preschool, thought it needed the preschoolers to add their part in colouring Churchill. So with the blessing of the GEP Art and Culture Pathway administrators, Sue, with Pooh Corner and Glendonald Park Preschool arranged KinderArt. Sue said she was very happy with the outcome.

Artist Ian Mitchell worked with the children last week. Ian painted the bollards supplied by Monash, and cut out the stencils the children used to decorate them.

John Vukovic, was busy painting part of the skate park as the preschool activities were progressing. He has seen how the students have become engrossed with what they are doing even though he has asked them to do things out of their comfort zone.
