

Federation University Australia, **Gippsland Campus** 

Limited CO2CRC and Federation University Australia have officially opened a new carbon capture and storage (CCS) laboratory at the University's Gippsland Campus.

Darren Minister for Infrastructure and Transport and Federal Member for Gippsland, opened this vital technology and analytical resource.

The FedUni laboratory is part of the Australian CCS Research Laboratories Network (CCSNet). is funded through a \$2.3 million agreement between the Australian Government's Education Infrastructure Fund and CO2CRC Limited.

The new laboratory will conduct important research into a range of CCS technologies, with the aim of reducing the cost of implementation so as to make price-competitive carbon reduction options.

"The new laboratory's location at Federation University Australia's Gippsland Campus is particularly fitting, given that nearly 90 per cent of Australia's brown coal reserves are located here," Dr Vincent Verheyen, Director of the Carbon Technology Research Centre at Federation University Australia, said.

"The laboratory make a significant contribution to the understanding and implementation of solvent-based post-combustion capture at Latrobe Valley Brown Coal power generation facilities.

While the initial focus of the facilities will be on local flue gas, the knowledge gained will be relevant to other power generators and broadened to precombustion coal to product applications around the country and internationally", Dr Verheyen said.

Tania Constable, CO2CRC's CEO, believes that carbon capture storage can and should play a vital role in supporting the renewal of the Gippsland region and Federation University will play its part.

Ms Constable said: "CCS is the only proven and reliable technology to remove large scale emissions from power generation and industrial processes. The Gippsland Community's Plan for action highlights the potential of CCS. This means thousands of jobs for the Gippsland region and will remove over 10 per cent of Australia's emissions".

One of the goals of the Commonwealth Education Infrastructure Funded Centre will be to focus on undertaking future energy training and research towards environmentally neutral and costed effective carbon based technologies.

The facility will provide a community focal point for science on brown coal and related energy knowledge topics. It will provide energy education services to community groups and students from primary school to post-graduate level.

## Stamp Matters

#### Stamp Auctions

One way of getting stamps that you need is to deal through an auction.

There are many of them and you do need to take care when selecting the auction site.

You can find a number of sites in the reputable stamp magazines and they will be a place where you can deal confidently.

They will vary a great deal in what they offer and their prices will vary as well from reasonably cheap to lots and lots.

Do not be afraid to deal overseas with stamp auction houses.

You will need to know exactly what you are bidding on, but the auction houses which advertise are part of a world-wide network which is honour-bound to deal with collectors fairly and honestly.

Payment to overseas sites is quite easy these days with the internet, and if you do not want to use your credit card directly, there is always Paypal which most auction houses use

The place where you do need to be really careful is on E-bay. Private sellers mostly are honest but you can get caught by people who will sell you stamps which are not what they seem.

It is possible today to take away the cancellation with chemicals and to re-gum a stamp, giving the appearance of a mint stamp which is much more valuable than a used one, and allowing the seller to charge a higher price.

These changes are usually recognisable to an expert and so the collector will be out of pocket when it comes to re-

selling the stamp.

The way to ensure a fair deal with E-bay is to check the price against the catalogue price and if the cost is lower, the deal is probably genuine.

Be wary if full catalogue price is being asked.

Stamp dealers often sell on E-bay and when they do this they will tell you they are members of ASDA or Australian Stamp Dealers Association, giving you a guarantee that they are reputable.

Other reliable networks are symbolised by PTS, APTA and IFSDA.

Auctions sometimes are held by local stamp clubs.

The lots are owned by club members and they sell off surplus stamps or stamps which are not needed in their collections.

The reserve prices of these lots are often well below catalogue prices and you can often pick up bargains at these events.

Warragul Stamp Club regularly holds two a year, usually in April and September, and about two hundred lots are sold to buyers who come from all over Gippsland.

The lots range from single stamps to collections of several hundreds and often more, with boxes of stamps taken off letters and packages and packets of miscellaneous stamps on offer.

These can be of great interest and lots of fun for a rainy afternoon to the avid collector.

Auctions allow collectors to fill in gaps in their collections reasonably cheaply as well as providing an opportunity to branch out into new fields of stamp collecting.


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



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## Space saving in Vegetable Gardens



By Sheina Renton

Fitting more vegetables into garden space can be achieved by interplanting deep rooted plants with shallow rooted plants.

Deep rooted plants take up nutrients at lower levels and compete less with plants nearby that take nutrients from upper levels.

Any shallow rooted plant will grow alongside deep rooted ones only if they have

similar soil requirements and water needs.

Deep rooted coriander grows well with potatoes. Tall slender plants like onions do well interplanted with lettuce which is shorter and spreading.

Some deep rooted plants asparagus, tomatoes, parsley and woody herbs.

Shallow rooted vegetables are beetroot, broccoli, potato, cabbage, lettuce, onion,

capsicum, cauliflower, peas and beans.

Climbing legumes give high yields using little horizontal space. Grow corn first then plant beans between the corn to climb up the corn stalk or plant squash between the corn rows for shade.



The Federal Government is delivering \$2.8 million for drug rehabilitation services in

Funding will be delivered by the Gippsland Primary Health Network.

The services will benefit communities across the Gippsland and McMillan electorates.

People in Gippsland whose lives have been affected by drug and alcohol abuse will benefit from Federal Government funding for additional drug rehabilitation support.

Federal Member for Gippsland, Darren Chester, announced funding during the Federal Election campaign for the Gippsland Primary Health Network (PHN) to improve treatment services for those affected by the drug 'ice'.

He recently met with Gippsland PHN CEO, Marianne Shearer and directors, Duncan Malcolm and Julie Rogalsky, to discuss proposals under consideration, including a rehabilitation day program, support for parents and carers of people misusing substances, indigenous-specific support, and an outreach service for

young people aged 12-25. Mr Chester said the PHN would seek feedback from primary healthcare professionals across Gippsland to help it tackle drug use. The new services will be operational by the start of next year.

"In response to the National Ice Taskforce findings, the Federal Government is providing more treatment services to people who are affected by drugs, while also providing support for their families and carers, and breaking the business model for drug dealers," Mr Chester said.

"The \$2.87 million commitment to the Gippsland PHN will allow it to provide practical solutions it believes are best suited to our region, using local knowledge, and adapting to local trends in drug and alcohol abuse.

While alcohol abuse remains a leading factor in health and violence problems in our region, the increased prevalence of 'ice' is extremely alarming and its affects are being felt in too many households and communities across region."

Ms Shearer said there was

a need to address gaps in the delivery of drug treatment and rehabilitation in Gippsland. "The feedback we are hearing from doctors and other primary health professionals across Gippsland includes a need for more education and prevention and family support services for people affected by drugs," Ms Shearer said.

"The Gippsland PHN's role is to ensure patients receive the right care in the right place at the right time, and ensuring our doctors and front-line professionals have the tools they need to provide that care.

We will continue to address gaps identified in the Gippsland PHN Needs Assessment following further review, engagement consultation with regional stakeholders, including Victorian Department of Health and Human Services and local service providers, Local Hospital Networks and the Aboriginal Community Controlled Health Organisations."

The Department of Health requires commissioned services to be operational by January 1, 2017.

## Support For Campaign To Keep Gippslanders Posted



Keep Me Posted campaign raises awareness of companies charging customers to receive paper bills and statements. Households can pay up to \$180 each year.

Rural and regional residents without internet are more likely to be affected.

People living in regional and rural areas are asking not to be penalised for receiving paper-based bills statements.

Federal Member for Gippsland Darren Chester recently met with advocates from Keep Me Posted, a group seeking community and political support to end additional fees being charged to receive a paper bill.

campaign also highlights how people living without the internet at home are unfairly penalised for receiving paper-based bills, when they have no other option. "There are many people in regional and rural areas who don't have access to the internet at home, and paper bills are their only option for receiving correspondence from utilities, banks and government organisations," Mr Chester said.

"These people incur out of pocket expenses that those with the internet do not, often through no fault of their own.

While I understand companies will need to recoup postage costs, it is important that cost is not inflated, and people have the right to choose to continue receiving paper bills."

Mr Chester said he continued to use paperbased mail for formal correspondence, supporting



## Northe calls for Latrobe Valley's unused nappies

Member for Morwell Russell Northe is once again participating in the Nappy Collective Giving Project and encouraging local parents with leftover unused nappies to donate them.

Mr Northe said the Nappy Collective Project aims to collect hundreds of thousands of leftover nappies from 390 official drop points in 44 towns and cities across Australia.

"To date over 1,449,693 nappies have been collected the commencement of the project in 2013," Mr Northe said.

"The Nappy Collective is a volunteer run, community organisation based established to collect leftover unused disposable nappies and redistribute them to organisations that support families in crisis or in need.

The unused nappies collected through my office will be distributed to local organisations that support victims of domestic violence and young mothers in need," he said.

"The Nappy Collective was launched in 2013 after a group of mother's had some leftover nappies that their children had grown out of, unsure of what to do with them they decided to donate them to families less fortunate."

Mr Northe said through the generosity of locals, 1,130 nappies were collected through the May drive of the collective from drop off points at Churchill Pharmacy, Churchill Neighbourhood Centre and his electorate

office in Morwell.

"Worthy organisations such as Berry Street, Anglicare Victoria and the Kurnai Young Parents program each received 376 nappies as part of the collection," Mr Northe said.

## Grand Strzelecki Track

#### Macks Creek Loop

In addition to connecting Morwell and Tarra-Bulga National Parks, the 110km Grand Strzelecki Track provides the option of three loop walks of one to two days each, radiating around Balook and the Visitors' Centre at Tarra-Bulga. Each loop takes in a different catchment and provides a variety of scenery, as well as historical features and ecosystems to discover.

The Macks Loop is 25km long via the recommended route, starting along Lyrebird Ridge Track and Forest Track in Tarra-Bulga. The walk leads down to the Macks Creek Valley and follows the creek before emerging onto Roberts Road and proceeding to Macks Creek Hall at the half way point. Definitely one of the prettiest parts of the entire Grand Strzelecki Track network, the Macks Creek Valley takes walkers through major environmental a restoration project featuring replanted, as well as intact, examples of Strzelecki Warm Temperate Rainforest.

Composed of different species the Cool Temperate Rainforest in Tarra-Bulga, Strzelecki Warm Temperate Rainforest occurs at lower altitudes and is an ecosystem unique to the Strzelecki Ranges with probably less than 200 hectares remaining. Scattered remnants managed to survive clearing, mostly in places where slopes were too steep to be easily farmed. Nevertheless, most of these remnants have been disturbed to some degree and invaded by weeds, especially blackberry.

The Macks Creek Valley was subject to two phases of land clearing, first during early European settlement then again in the 1970s when most of the valley was owned by a consortium of Melbourne investors known as the Macks Creek Pastoral Company.

This venture was shortlived and the land was then taken over by the Forests Commission of Victoria and planted pines. Mature native forest remaining at that time in the upper section of Macks Creek was scheduled to be logged and converted to pine

plantation, but was saved by lobbying from the newly formed Balook and District Residents' Association and is now incorporated into Tarra-Bulga National Park where it is safe for all to enjoy.

Some of the walking track leading down to and following Macks Creek was originally bulldozed in during the 1970s as a forestry road for extracting timber from what is now the National Park.

In 2008 a major cooperative project was undertaken between HVP Plantations - current owners of the land below the Park boundary - Parks Victoria, West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority and Monash University, supported by the National Blackberry Taskforce, to remove weeds and restore canopy trees along a 4km stretch of the valley from above the Park boundary to Roberts Road.

Forty hectares of weed removal was undertaken, much of it on precipitous slopes and eleven thousand trees were planted with the help of a Federal Open Grant of \$211,000. Eight years on, the transformation has been remarkable. It takes many decades to fully restore this rainforest, but it is well on its

Walkers can see the progress for themselves and experience rare examples of intact Strzelecki Warm Temperate Rainforest still remaining, with the help of interpretive signs erected as part of the project.

If you just want to enjoy the scenery, there is plenty of that! Macks Creek is a beautiful mountain stream with rock pools and Gardiner Falls, by which the walking track passes, makes a great photo spot, especially after wet weather (this waterfall is on a small tributary).

For those who want just the highlights and not an extended walk, the Roberts Road Bridge at the start of the bitumen is a three hour walk from Balook and a good place to leave cars if doing a car shuffle.

To this point the walk is graded moderate in difficulty, with four creek crossings

to be made and some steep slopes.

Bush camping is permitted at the Bird Road Bridge before the track emerges onto Roberts Road, or at the Macks Creek Hall.

For larger groups the Hall can be hired for \$100 per night, providing access to toilets, cooking facilities and shelter (see the website www. grandstrzeleckitrack.org.au for details). Please note that camp fires are not permitted

on any part of the Grand Strzelecki Track at any time

The return to Balook is via Bulga Park Road for the first 4km, then the former mail coach route (Old Coach Road, also known as Old Yarram-Balook Road).

This is now a forestry road climbing gently through plantations for much of the way, before reaching Tarra-Bulga National Park.

There are some vantage points where views across the coastline from Wilson's Promontory to Woodside are quite spectacular!


Track is managed and maintained by community volunteers and receives only small amounts of maintenance money from councils and sponsors.














She is co-founder and publishing director of "Kill Your Darlings" literary journal and an editor at Text Publishing. "Bad Behaviour" is her first book.

The story is being told as an adult who has revisited the campus where the story is set, with reference to her diaries written at the time.


"Bad Behaviour" has been described as part "Mean Girls" and part "Lord of the Flies" and is a memoir of bullying and boarding school.

At age fourteen, Rebecca has a scholarship to attend an exclusive private school and spend a year away from family and friends, cut off from the outside world.

The aim of the experience is to develop resilience, confidence and independence. The group consists of sixteen girls who are largely unsupervised.

Being on a scholarship means that Rebecca feels pressure from her parents, who have made sacrifices to enable her to attend this school, and also from not wanting the other girls to know, as she wants desperately to belong.

The story details her feelings of isolation and homesickness, the brutal environment she finds herself in and the harsh punishment that is handed out.



She is a participant and later the victim of aggression, bullying, spiteful, vicious and degrading behaviours.

The book then explores the effect this has on her relationships with her parents and brother and on future relationships, as well as the nature of female friendships and her coming to terms with her sexuality.

While reading this story one wonders how the situation was able to deteriorate to such a point - where were the teachers, where was the supervision, who were the role models?

This was a compelling story, and whilst the members of our book group consider themselves to be broad minded, we were appalled at the alleged behaviour outlined in this book.

It left us all questioning the wisdom of sending children away for a year at such a vulnerable age.

Firstly:- the Land Conservation Council has seen fit, in its proposed recommendations for the Valley Latrobe Special Investigation, to recommend that the SECV land (6ha) at the end of Tebb Terrace should be managed by C.F. & L, it is not final as yet, but looks promising.

Secondly: - at present

the Minister for C.F. & L. Joan Kirner is considering a proposal to initially fund totally the Billy's creek land purchase with the proviso that the community undertakes some responsibility future development funding. This also looks promising, however we will have to wait and see!

After all that, the walk didn't start until fairly late, about 2.30pm when we headed off up the main firebreak. Ian had in mind that we might cut and pull some pines out as we went. ## The Hub Preschool

Justine Barrett, from the "Happy Little Scientists" program, provided an exciting range of science activities for the children to enjoy.

Safety rules were carefully explained, and protective safety glasses were provided. The children understood why they were only allowed to move and touch certain experiments.

These preschoolers loved seeing Justine use warm

water, dry ice and detergent to make ... lots of bubbles!

They learnt the scientific terms "hypothesise" and "make predictions", to describe what might happen with each experiment.

They learnt also that dry ice is made differently to our everyday ice from the fridge.

The dry ice could not only vibrate on a metal spoon but it could also blow up a balloon as it released its

carbon dioxide gas to room temperature.

Another experiment involved testing the pH of water using the universal indicator dye. Then when the dry ice was added to this water, the colour and pH of the water changed.

The final experiments involved looking at the properties of cornflour and water ... in slime!
