

Expanding Gippsland Community Bank® Network

The campaign to gain pledges will be accelerated this year with the committee hoping to have the pledge part of the process wrapped up with increased community support within a few months. Once this is achieved, a feasibility study

conducted by an independent company will be conducted to asses the viability of the business before a vote is taken on whether to proceed, a prospectus issued, pledges called in and a fit out of premises started

Mr Casey said the other Gippsland Community Bank® branches where a great example of what could be achieved in Churchill with nearby Bunyip returning almost \$60,000 in grants, donations and sponsorships to their community last financial year.



Churchill and District Community Association invites all local residents and interested parties to our next meeting, at which a special presentation will be given by members of the 'Plan Our Park Action Committee' (POPAC).

This group has a vision for the Walker Parade land across Monash Way from the shopping centre. Many locals, including Churchill Primary School students, use the path through this parcel of land.

POPAC has presented a plan to Latrobe City Council for the development of this land into another formal park for the residents of Churchill. Council requested CDCA's comments on the plan. As other ideas have also been put forward to CDCA, including that of having some medium density residential development in the area, we are keen to hear the view(s) of our community.

CDCA has also invited Council representatives to attend this meeting, to hear the views put forward by residents and follow up any questions around planning issues that may arise.

This special meeting will be held at the Churchill Community Hub in Phillip Parade at 7pm on Wednesday 24 February. Tea and coffee will be provided and we hope to see many residents in attendance.

Users of the Hub and Phillip Parade may have noticed (road) works being undertaken in this area. Power cables have been put underground between McDonald Way and Balfour Place.

Council has been preparing tender documents for the reconstruction' of Phillip Parade, along with extra parking adjacent to the Hub. It is hoped works will begin on this project prior to the end of the financial year.

Likewise, tender documents are being prepared for the construction and landscaping of the new 'Town Hall Plaza' and works should begin mid-year.

CDCA representatives are involved in the Churchill Town Centre Plan 'Implementation Consultation Group'. This is an exciting project to be involved in seeing Churchill "get a facelift". Plans include a second 'plaza' (the 'Town Centre Plaza'), a centrally located bus stop, the re-alignment of Georgina Place and other new developments.

There will, no doubt, be some inconvenience to

motorists and pedestrians during construction phase(s), but every endeavour will be made to keep these to a minimum. However, we can look forward to a much improved, 'user-friendly' town centre in the future.

Motorists may have noticed new road markings that create a formal T-intersection where Georgina Place currently meets the new Balfour Place through-road, between Woolworths and the petrol station.

It was brought to CDCA's attention that initially, due to a lack of signage or road markings, there was some confusion amongst motorists regarding which vehicles should give way. CDCA raised this issue with Council (there are usually 1 or more Council officers in attendance at CDCA meetings) and the matter was attended to promptly.

'Giving Way' at this intersection is now quite clear vehicles entering Balfour Place from Georgina Way must give way to Balfour Place traffic.

In the same way, CDCA was earlier able to address the issue of potential collision at the Balfour Place/Balfour Way intersection. This resulted in the newly created roundabout which slows traffic and indicates that drivers must give way to vehicles on the right. Often, such safety matters can be easily addressed

and CDCA is able to take up residents' concerns in the appropriate forum. We welcome all residents of Churchill and district at our meetings and always allocate time on our regular meeting agenda for the raising of issues by those attending.

Whilst we encourage residents to join - our annual membership fee is \$2 - you do not have to be a member to attend our meetings or raise your concerns.

CDCA meets on the 4th Wednesday of the month at 7pm, usually in the Churchill Hub.

Next meeting is on Wednesday 24 February, 7pm at the Hub, where the main item of business will be the presentation by the 'Plan Our Park Action Committee' on the Walker Parade parkland, with questions and discussion to follow.

Free Music Festival in Boolarra

Over eight hours of traditional folk, bluegrass, blues, roots, Celtic and world music for free! Hard to believe but it's happening at the next Boolarra Folk Festival to be held on Saturday, February 27, 2010.

It's a great family day with a varied line-up of entertainers. Returning to the town are Melbourne band, The Go Set, who combine the folk elements of the bagpipes, accordion, and mandolin with distorted punk guitars and a rock 'n' roll ethos, as well local group, The Strzelecki Stringbusters, with their mix of mandolins, banjos, guitars and fiddles. The 2010 festival will also feature The Original Snakeskins, Croque Monsieur and The Stillsons, an Indie folk music outfit, tinged with country blues, who have received radio play on Radio National (ABC), Triple J, Triple R, PBS, Joy FM, and 3MBS. Other popular performers include Danny Burton, Todd Cook and the Celtic-inspired Evelyn's Secret.

The town centre will come alive. The performance area is located in shady 'Centenary Park', and nearby in 'Railway Park' there will be a large food and arts/crafts market with stalls to explore and buskers to be heard. The kid's tent and the healing area are always popular. Carparking is free.

Festival Director Ray Stewart says "Last year's festival, with visitor numbers in excess of 9000, was a great success especially after the town surrounds were hit by bushfire. We are expecting that this year's festival, and the great community spirit that goes with it, will continue to attract a large audience."

A pre-festival gig featuring local acts will be held on the Friday night, February 26 at Yinnar A.R.C from 7.30pm and the festival gets underway in Boolarra at 11am on Saturday. An informal 'open mike' session, where budding musicians can play to an appreciative audience, will be held at the local football clubrooms at the festival's end around 7.30pm.

The 'School Drumming Performance' will return this year. This extremely popular act will open the festival at 11am.

Letter to the Editor

Hooning

Being woken up at the unearthly hour of 2am by somebody wanting to communicate by way of hooning through Churchill last week, gave me ample time to contemplate the possible messages that hooning tries to convey. It is suggested that it is a way to gain social status, or defining a self-concept. If this is true, why keep everybody in the dark as to the identity of our hoonartists? How can we possibly admire people with these exceptional skills if we cannot put a face to the activity?

This is a fascinating phenomenon. How is it possible that a mature person (mature=old enough to have obtained a driver's license) so obviously and openly, brags or shows off in public. This is behavior that I always thought should be tolerated and accepted with patience - that is, insecurity, not hooning – but in association with young and therefore immature children. Since I assume that all these drivers have obtained a driver's license at some stage, this age group cannot apply to them. (Which is why I think the licensing authorities should focus more on a sense of responsibility than on skills.).

I wonder if these guys could be looking to impress others by a show of dominance and intimidation?:

Dominating a mechanical object, a car, which has no choice in the matter

Dominating everybody in hearing distance or sight, any time of day, night but preferably early morning hours, intruding in the sense of making a nuisance of yourself. (Invariably I find myself being confronted by a feeling of apathy if one of these drivers should be injured during these burnouts.)

Intimidating others without the slightest sense of consequence, should our skillful hooners lose control over the vehicle and plough into our gardens or homes where we like to feel safe and offer protection to our loved ones.

Fortunately for those with this tendency, Victoria's rain pattern (1-5mm at a time) also suits their habits. Sometimes these hooners idle up (peacefully) close to a street corner, from where they depart (!) with screeching tyres. This display of power gives rise to a primeval fear: that of a prey being stalked when he least expects it, or of somebody in command of a dangerous tool (a speeding car) when he might not be thinking clearly.

Unfortunately (depending on the stance you take) I have also noticed the reaction of the general public to this lifestyle, a point that may disappoint enthusiasts: nobody interrupts a conversation when this happens, looks up or even vaguely indicates that they have noticed. This reminds me of the time I was training a puppy according to the principle of: reward good behavior, ignore bad behavior. The ignored behavior eventually disappears, for lack of reaction.

Hopefully this applies to other species too. If so, it defies the action, doesn't it?



Bob Cooper: Tamworth Country Sowngwriter's Association Finalist

Bob Cooper can remember country music being a part of his life for almost as long as he has lived. There was a time when he was first married that it was on hold for a while, but in 1995 Bob started playing the guitar again for two reasons, the most important to lift the spirits of his terminally ill daughter Danielle, but also to practice, because country music was returning to his life.

In 1998, after three years of practice, Bob went to the Bairnsdale Country Music Club and played three songs. His idea was to gauge the reaction of the members and gain some feedback. One comment was, "Where have you been hiding all these years?"

With that, Bob continued to attend Bairnsdale and Moe Country Music Clubs where he would perform in a 'walk up'. He would come from the audience and play.

He was invited to enter a song-writing contest in 2007, to write a song about a Melbourne Cup Winner of 1915. A statue of this horse, Patrobis, is in the main street of Rosedale. This contest fell through, so Bob entered the song in the 2007 Latrobe Valley Eisteddfod and won the Country Songwriting section, which started Bob's songwriting career.

Since then he has written twenty-four songs, both melody and words, recorded a CD, is currently recording another CD and has several other songs also written but not recorded.

In 2008, he wrote a song, "Sadness in Her Eyes", which reached the Tamworth Songwriting Association grand finals.

In 2009 he again reached the grand finals with "No Middle Road"

Even though Bob did not win either of the finals, the recognition he received from his peers and other recording artists of the same style, has been a highlight of his short songwriting career, and is spurring him on with ten new songs ready to go in future years.


As part of Bob's writing career in the

last two years he has been as a founding member of, and in association with the "Our Kind of Country Club", which is located in Crinigan Road in Morwell. There music nights are held every second Friday and they encourage artists of all ability to 'walk up' and perform.

For a short while, the club tried to establish itself in Churchill at the Cricket Club, but due to lack of patronage, it folded.

However, during that time, several groups benefited from the funds generated. The charity works continued in the Morwell venue, where two fire recovery concerts were held for Churchill and Callignee. The Club regularly performs at senior citizens homes, and they raise funds for the Royal Children's Hospital.

Helping Locally and Internationally

Despite the holiday break, January has been a busy month for members of the Rotary Club of Hazelwood.

The club supported a scout with mobility difficulties to attend the Australian Scout Jamboree in Campbellfield, New South Wales, by providing a motorized wheel chair to help her get around and participate in Jamboree activities. This not only increased her mobility but also reduced her reliance on others for assistance.

Rotary Club Service Director, Reg Kemp said that it was very rewarding for the Club to be able to assist a young person in this way. "Whenever we hear that support is needed we are always keen to help if we can," he said.

On Australia Day, the club provided a BBQ at Callignee for those people who were victims of the Black Saturday bush fires. Nine Rotarians assisted on the day and provided over 260 meals to the local people. Many residents are still experiencing trauma as they deal with the recovery process. The response from the people of Callignee and surrounding districts was overwhelming with many expressing their heartfelt thanks to Club members.

The Saturday and Sunday prior

to Australia Day saw the Club conducting BBQ's at Bunnings and all funds were committed to the Haiti victims. Over the two days, almost \$2,000 was raised and this money went towards the supply of two shelter boxes as part of the Rotary international aid to the victims of the Haiti earthquake.

Gallery arc Regeneration Exhibition



Gallery arc is featuring an exciting yet sobering group exhibition called "Regeneration" this month. Twelve months since the Delburn and Churchill bushfires reeked havoc on local families the exhibition attempts to reflect back and find positive stories from those affected.

With funding from Arts Victoria and Regional Arts Victoria arc Yinnar was able to host a four day series of intensive art workshops in Yinnar, at no cost to those interested in expressing their ideas.

Arc member artists led these well attended activities. Many of the pieces made in the workshops are included in the Regeneration exhibition. A wide variety of works including ceramics, printmaking, sculpture, photography, wirework and book binding is on show. On the opening night visitors heard from the drumming circle and the vocal nosh singers - also part of the workshop program.

Other works include the large Boolarra Community Quilt made in the town by local women meeting weekly and led by artist Meg Viney. A series of photographic portraits by Rod Bechaz called 'Precious Little Remains' bring a tear to your eye as you read each subject's story of the personal objects they hold, rescued from pending disaster.

Many other photographs relating to the fires are on show, also pastels, watercolours, oil paintings and mixed media works. A simple and powerful sculpture in the form of a tree by John Abery of Hazelwood North, uses burnt and rusted carpentry tools from his studio which was destroyed in the fires. A few small green leaves are entwined around the objects indicating a message of hope.

The Regeneration exhibition is on show until Saturday 27 February.

Gallery arc is on Main Street in Yinnar and is open Tuesday to Fridays 12 - 4 pm; Saturdays 11am to 3pm. Group bookings to see the exhibition may be arranged at other times by appointment; phone 5163 1310 or email arcyinnar@speedweb.com.au.

Heather Kuijpers and Sharon Heffernan from Jeeralang share their story of Black Saturday, one year on.

The day changed their lives forever, but both can see positive aspects which evolved, some from their own staunch determination to make it so for themselves, their families and others around them and some from the outstanding support they received from many sources.

Heather Kuijpers

"It is called 'Black Saturday', but for my family it was much more than that; It was also 'Black Sunday', 'Black Monday', 'Black Tuesday' and still it goes on.

We were there, we got caught, no time to flee. We had a fire plan. We were prepared to defend our home and our animals, but we were not prepared for the fire ball of a monster that confronted us.

It changed me; it took part of me with it, my confidence. I had no control, I could not keep my family safe. By 6 pm the fire ball had already taken our farm, was it going to take our house where we were sheltering and my whole family with it? The floor was hot, flames were coming in through the back door.

Darkness, children crying, smoke alarms wailing, and a smoke filled house. Stinging eyes and troubled breathing. Still the windows and the back door glowed, and the roar of that monster. Would he take us with him or would he release us?

After the longest ten minutes, when I feared for my husband's life, my children's and my own life, I could feel him releasing us, the roar gone as quickly as it had come upon us.

The next few hours we were on auto-pilot trying to minimise the burning. We watched two of our neighbours houses burn to the ground, feeling useless, not being able to do a thing to stop their houses burning, feeling guilty knowing we still had our home. I managed to settle the children into bed, finally my husband and I fell in a heap at about 4am.

We knew we had lost some animals, most had survived, but it would be the light of day that would show us the real picture. I couldn't open the gate because the post had burned through and the gate would just fall down with the rest of the fences. The hay shed and all our winter feed was gone. The paddocks charred black. Some farm machinery and the kids outdoor toys all gone.

And people ask: "Were you affected by the fires?"

"Yes" I say, "It went right through our farm." "Did you lose your house?" they ask "No" I say

"Well you were lucky, imagine those poor people who lost their houses!" they say.

> One year after the fires, how do I feel? I feel many things. I feel different, changed somehow. My eyes have been opened. I have a better understanding of others who have faced or are facing a major trauma.

My heart feels heavy, my stomach turns over. I do feel sorry for the people who lost their houses, but I don't feel lucky. My family and I spent ten minutes in hell and were released to a black burnt-out mess that reminds us every day of what we went through. We were not lucky.....

One year after the fires, how do I feel? I feel many things. I feel different, changed somehow. My eyes have been opened. I have a better understanding of others who have faced or are facing a major trauma. My heart goes out to them, knowing that there is a process that they must go through and how that journey can be so different from one person to the next.

Now I do feel lucky, lucky to be an Aussie. I have seen how a whole community can pull together in a crisis. The help and support has been amazing. I am so grateful to everyone who has helped us along the way; family, friends, neighbors, work colleges, government bodies, volunteers, random acts of kindness from complete strangers. There is no way I know to thank everyone for all the support, the occasional nudge, or for the much needed ear to vent to, other than to say, "It worked!!!.... I'm here, I've comethrough it." My family has come through this trauma intact, I can't speak for others, but all your efforts have worked for me, tomorrow is a bright new day and for that I thank you,....., thank you, thank you, thank you.

Sharon Heffernan

My husband and I used these words to describe Black Saturday.

The day was eerie from start- a day which promised to be what it turned out to be dry,

windy, painfully hot with us on guard constantly. This was summer, curtains closed and limited water. Alarm bells sounded at the first sight of smoke. This was the time."The Real Fire Plan" to be immediately put into action.Prior to our leaving, frantic last minute phone calls were made warning neighbours, and receiving calls from panicking family and friends. I was terrified as I ran away leaving behind loved family members and neighbours. My husband waited on for the predicted wind change which came with an eerie ten minutes of silence before death was knocking at our back door. There was darkness and the deafening sound of the wind and fire, a suction of the oxygen from the air, sparks of debris and fire balls hitting like a nine inch grinder at 150 km/h.

After Black Saturday, returning home, the drive felt like the war had hit the Jeeralangs. The fire storm dramatically bombed our country side with a black autumn appearance. Burnt smell of tragic losses; lives, homes, properties, livestock, wildlife, traumatic physical and financial loss. Privacy and density wiped away- naked to the strong winds. I felt exposed.

It was vital to me to immediately rebuild normality, family lifestyle. But that was not going to be as immediate as I would like. For my husband there were fifteen days with no running water, or electricity, no cooked meals, no family.

I found I had to have the kids within arms reach at all times.

I felt I needed to mentally survive, to set an example, as kids sponge off your emotions. They were already traumatized and insecure as our home was upside down with our family separated, and I didn't want them to feel worse because of how I felt. But they helped me. They don't let you stop. They keep you going as they still need feeding, bathing, dressing, reading to. So we kept up the routine of kinder, swimming lessons etc. My view was that if our routine was OK we would be OK. It felt very reassuring and comforting to have the kids around.

The regular drive home through the black bush became gloomy. But we had to stay on the bright side, so we purposely looked for and admired, every new change which we would never have been able to experience before- tree ferns with magnificent green fronds, trees sprouting, stringy barks misty green, mauve and grey, blue gums red orange color, wildflowers like blue bells starting to bloom, and even grass growing in the bush.

At home I chose not to look around me and see the whole picture, but to concentrate on the next few steps ahead of me. One lady asked me, "How do you keep going, always worrying about future fires, packing and evacuating?" I thought back to what my Mum had said about there being someone who was always worse off. I thought about the war years when daily people had to suffer poverty, depression, regular hideouts in bomb shelters, illness, disease and the agonizing wait for the arrival of a death notice of a family's soldier. They got through it and I feel we can get through it, even though we may have to face more bad times ahead.

Our lives had been spared, but we felt that we

would now be slaves to the fire devastation in rebuilding and replacing our losses. We thought it should not be for others to judge, compare or comment, unless they had worn our shoes! But the generosity of Australians was overwhelming. The Salvation Army, case managers, volunteers, neighbors all lifted our spirits in ways we didn't expect. The Aussie strength combined with governments, councils, contractors, organizations, fund raising groups, to all work together. We will continue our re-uniting process with our neighbors and community, because through that we can grow within our newly established support network.

Much more could be recorded here. But what is written is for the benefit of all those who went through this trauma. You may identify with the thoughts, feelings and positives outcomes experiences by these two special people. They hope that in sharing their thoughts it may be of help to others.

Churchill Citizen of the Year 2010 Valerie Giles A caring person with a strong passion for helping others

Churchill Citizen of the Year, Valerie Giles, is, without doubt, a very worthy recipient of this award in recognition of her compassion and caring for others within the community. Val has always had a strong passion for helping others, especially the aged, Veterans and the disabled.

Val was born and educated in Yallourn. Her parents, the Wilden's, were early settlers in the Old Brown Coal Mine, now known as Yallourn North. After finishing her schooling Val chose nursing as a career and trained at Yallourn and Traralgon hospitals. After her training she worked in all Latrobe Valley hospitals, gaining a reputation as an excellent nurse.

In 1969 she married a Vietnam Veteran and moved to Churchill where they began to raise a family. During her children's education, she was actively involved in canteen duties, school council and parents associations of Churchill North Primary School and Kurnai College. During this period she also owned and operated Pooh Corner, one of the first Child Care Centres to be established in Victoria. Over the years this business has operated from Monash University, Churchill and is currently operating from the Churchill Hub. After selling the business Val moved back into nursing and became very involved in aged care. Val formed and coordinated a Day Care Centre at the Morwell Nursing Home upon leaving general nursing. She then became involved in aged care nursing with BapCare, the Salvation Army and Silver Circle. She achieved levels of care, coordination and assessments for the aged, not only locally but across Gippsland. Whilst in these roles, Val liaised with local councils to set up the best quality of care for the aged in the community.

Val retired to care for her husband who was suffering PTSD, a legacy from the Vietnam War. Whilst in retirement she continued to volunteer in

and around the community, especially the veteran and aged community of the Morwell RSL. Within the Morwell RSL she is the only female on committee and is Welfare Coordinator. In this role she was instrumental in forming the Day Club. To this day she remains a coordinator as it continues with its success in supporting veterans and their families. Val is also actively involved with the Morwell Red Cross Unit, as a co-ordinator of the Emergency Service Unit and Blood Bank assistant. She has also been chairperson of the organisation.

During the Black Saturday bushfires Val's property was threatened by fire and she and her husband evacuated. Fortunately their proper-



ty was saved and the very next day Val on behalf of the Red Cross, was in the Traralgon Emergency Centre working to help and support others who unfortunately were affected. She put in big hours over the next week.

Throughout her life Val has also had a passion for caring for people with intellectual disabilities. She worked for Interchange where she offered respite and care for the disabled. She has always, and continues to, care and have responsibilities for her sister who has an intellectual disability.

Thank you Val for your years of dedication to our community, your work is commendable.

CFA Volunteer Ashleigh Caldwell Churchill Young Citizen of the Year

Ashleigh Caldwell joined Churchill CFA in September 2008. She has completed her Minimum Skills Wildfire component, which enables her to participate in wildfire activities such as bushfires. Ashleigh has also completed her Low Structure and Hazmet Awareness components.

Ashleigh assists with Brigade activities which includes the 'Brigades in Schools' program and servicing fire extinguishers throughout the Churchill community. In October 2009, she was presented with 'Rookie of the Year' for her dedicated and professional approach to the Brigade and the community as a whole.

Ashleigh was a new rookie when Churchill experienced the devastating fires in February 2009. She was too young to fight the fires but she supported her

fellow members and the community by helping at the Fire Station with numerous tasks. She is only too willing to take on new tasks and learn more skills to enhance her knowledge when dealing with potential fire risks.

As well as being an active member of the Brigade, Ashleigh is a student at Kurnai College. She was awarded the RSL Weary Dunlop Scholarship and a Conservation / Energy and Mining Corporation Scholarship.

Ashleigh is an inspiration to the younger generation of Churchill and it is hoped that she will become a fully fledged firefighter in the not too distant future.

The Boolarra Community was thrilled last week to learn that the Boolarra Folk Festival has won the Latrobe City Australia Day "Community Event of the Year" Award for the 2009 festival.

This is the second time this event has won this award, the first being for the 2007 festival. The award was given in recognition of the effort made to stage the 2009 event, just 5 weeks after the bushfires swept through the district leaving a trail of devastation in its wake.

During the weeks leading up to the festival we could sense from the reaction of people offering support to ours and neighbouring communities affected by the fires, that we were in for our biggest crowd yet.

It was possibly the most people to have visited the town during a single day in the towns 130 year history, in excess of 9,000 people came.

It was a challenge to be able to cater for such a large crowd, for example having to provide a variety of foods and drinks takes some doing, however the town coped quite well.

The assistance from groups such as the Churchill Lions Club who assisted our locals with the car parking was timely, that was one area we would have found difficult had we not had their help.

With many still reeling from the effects of the recent events it was the first real opportunity for many peo-

ple to sit down and talk of their experiences or listen to those of others.

With the friendly and relaxed carnival like atmosphere of music, market stalls and other activities that took place throughout the parks, there was an obviously strong bond between people, from our community, and also between people from neighbouring communities who were showing their support by just being there.

The generosity of Latrobe City Bus Lines in providing a free bus service from Traralgon to Boolarra via Traralgon South and Churchill was a tremendous gesture.

It was good having people come to the festival who were affected by the Churchill fires. I spoke to one family that had lost everything. They were enjoying the day out, listening to music and catching up with friends.

We had people from near and far come and help out on the day, members of the Heyfield Lions Club turned up to do what ever they could to help.

The surveys done during the event were full of praise for the festival, the town's setting, lovely parks, the good music and market stalls, took many first time attendees by surprise.

The 2010 Boolarra Folk Festival will again be staged in the town centre on Saturday February 27th. This will be the eighth festival and as

ir with all previous festivals this year's will again be a free event.

The festival will open at ARC Yinnar on the Friday night the 26th, 4 acts will perform between 8pm and midnight. There will be a small cover charge.



As a young girl growing up in Dromore, County Down, Northern Island Kathleen McDonnell would often help her mother prepare traditional Irish apple pratie. She continues to sometimes make it for her family today even though Australia has been her home since 1971.


APPLE PRATIE

prevent browning while rolling out pastry.

Lightly grease 20 cm pie plate. Divide pastry in half. Roll out one half to fit base of pie plate. Arrange drained apple slices over pastry base, sprinkle with cinnamon and drizzle with honey.

Roll out remaining pastry to cover top of pie. Trim and decorate edges. Cut three deep slits in pastry to allow steam to escape. Glaze with egg or water and sprinkle with 1 tablespoon sugar. Bake for 30-40 minutes until golden. Serve immediately with whipped cream.

Rain Gauge Weather Observations

It was suggested by one of the Churchill News team members that it would be a good idea to record rainfall in Churchill. Quite often, there seems to be a difference in this area compared to Morwell and Traralgon.

We have now set up a rain gauge and have been recording rainfall in Churchill and will compare our monthly figures with those of the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) who record weather at Latrobe Valley Airport (always bearing in mind that they are 'professionals' and we are 'amateurs'!) .

As we did not begin recording until 13 January we cannot compare the figures for that month but we will bring you our observations for February in the next edition.

Interestingly on the 5 February, we recorded 19.6mm of rain whereas the BOM recorded 31mm.

For those interested the figures recorded by the BOM for January were as follows:

Total Rainfall: 26.0mm. Highest temperature: 40.1. Lowest temperature: 5.2.



This year, renowned local drummer Steve Shultz will lead our students in performing a drumming extravaganza at 11am to kick off the musical performances.







To celebrate the reopening of the pool and the new gym space at Latrobe Leisure Churchill, Latrobe City Council is hosting an open weekend at the facility on Saturday 13 and Sunday 14 February 2010.

Latrobe City mayor, Cr Kellie O'Callaghan said the Churchill facility will be open to the public at no charge over the weekend to encourage the community to experience the completed upgrades. The no charge offer includes use of the pool and the gym equipment.

"The Churchill Leisure facility is undergoing an extensive \$4.8 million redevelopment which is progressing well. Redevelopment has now reached a very exciting stage with the reopening of the pool and the new gym space earlier this week," Cr O'Callaghan said.

"The new gym space is almost three times the size of the old gym and features an improved user-friendly layout and space. There is a new audio and visual cardio area, a new assessment room, and there will be some exciting new equipment arriving shortly."

Latrobe City councillor, Cr Darrell White, said pool users will note a huge difference in the aquatic area.

"The pool hall has received a facelift with new aquatic grade paint; and the pool deck surrounds and change rooms have also received a facelift with the vibrant Latrobe Leisure corporate colours being applied to provide a fresh clean appearance," Cr White said.

"The construction of the stadium is progressing well with upgrades to the stadium space to include three new fully compliant multi-use courts, new change and toilet facilities, and upgraded reception. To improve accessibility for all users, there will also be a lift installed.

"This is a major redevelopment from which the community as a whole will benefit. The various sports participants, keepfitters, families, workers, students and other community members can look forward to embracing a facility that encompasses their individual needs."

The project is scheduled for completion



in August 2010, and is a collaborative effort between Latrobe City Council and Monash University Gippsland, with funding from Latrobe City, Monash University and the Federal Government.

During the first two weeks of February 2010 Latrobe Leisure will also be offering a discounted membership rate on Gold direct debit, reduced to \$50 per month for the first 12 months of the membership or a term membership through until 30 June for \$300.
